Clothing Needed! From October 2025 through February 2026

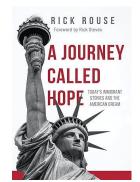

Food of the Months - October & November

This year, again, we will be packing Emergency Bags for the Hopelink Food Bank. So, during the months of October and November, we will be collecting the food items to go in the Emergency Bags. Hopelink has asked that we pack "**No-Cook" bags** as we did last year. They need these to support those with no access to cooking facilities (homeless).

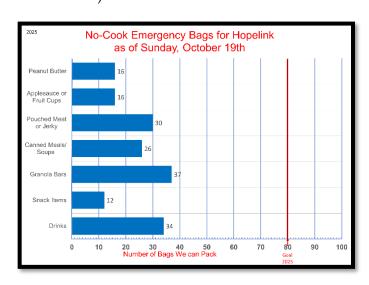
The items in these bags need to be able to be eaten directly without being heated or the use of a can opener. These need to be things that can be eaten cold and plain.

- **All canned items must have a pop-top lid. Only soups and meals are in cans.
- **PAY ATTENTION TO SIZES. Keeping the weight down is important for homeless. Bigger sizes can't be used.
- **MAKE SURE TO CHECK EXPIRATION DATES. They need to be on or after February 2026.

There are seven different items that go in each "No-Cook" Emergency Bag. We will be collecting these items during October and November:

Here are the seven items we will be collecting:

- 1 **Peanut Butter** (~16 oz. plastic jar no-stir)
- 1 **Applesauce or Fruit Cups** Package (packages of 4 or 6 cups (about 4 ounce cups), kept in original packaging so that it contains the label, ex: peaches, pears, fruit cocktail, applesauce)
- 2 **Pouched Meat or Jerky** (beef jerky or meat sticks (like slim Jims), pouched meat like tuna, chicken, salmon (Starkist is a common brand) Common sizes for both are about 2.5 3 ounces.)
- 2 Canned Meals/Soups (ex: ~15-20 oz, ex: chili, beef stew, canned ravioli, hearty Progresso soups (such as: beef pot roast, chicken pot pie, Italian Wedding, etc. - Pop-Top lid)
- 6 **Granola Bars** (look for ones that are at least 150 200 calories each total at least 1,000 calories)
- 5 **Snack Items** (high in calories & will not crush easily. Ex: dried fruit, nuts, trail mix. Individual packages look for ones that are at least 100 150 calories each total at least 500 calories)
- 2 **Shelf-Stable Drinks** (Something that does not require refrigeration and will not puncture easily. Ex: juice boxes, water, protein shakes.)

Hello from the Saint Andrew's Constitution Task Force!

The Constitution Task Force (CTF) was activated in March 2025 to consider a variety of topics which could potentially change the Saint Andrew's Constitution. This past summer, the CTF asked the congregation for input regarding two of these topics. Thank you to all who completed the CTF's questionnaire!

After several meetings of thoughtful discussion, including review of questionnaire responses, the CTF submitted to the Congregation Council its recommendations for changes to the Saint Andrew's Constitution. Major recommendations submitted to the Council include:

- Reducing the number of elected adult Council member positions from twelve (12) to nine (9).
- Keeping the normal term length for elected adult Council members at three (3) years.
- Allowing Council officers to serve three consecutive one-year terms in the same office, but only with unanimous Council approval. (Currently, officers are limited to serving two consecutive terms in the same office.)
- Providing the Council flexibility on whether or not to fill a vacancy on the Council.
- Allowing for a range of four to six members on the Nominating Committee (current requirement is six members.)

At its November meeting, the Congregation Council plans to vote on whether or not to forward these CTF recommendations to the congregation for approval. If you have feedback or input for the Council on any of these recommendations, please contact Council President Tom Getzinger, tomget@hotmail.com, or Constitution Task Force chair Susan Hegedus, susanhegedus@outlook.com, no later than **November 5**, **2025**.

Ultimately, the congregation will vote on all CTF recommended changes to the Saint Andrew's Constitution as approved by the Council. Opportunities for reviewing all proposed Constitution change recommendations approved by the Council will occur later this fall.

From the Bishop:

November 2025

Dear Beloveds,

Across our country, people are struggling – financially, emotionally, spiritually. Division, violence, and uncertainty are paramount. We are living in a time when the weight of the world feels heavier than most of us can bear. Families are being torn apart, communities are threatened, and political leaders are trading compassion for power. Every day seems

more chaotic and unmoored than the day before. For many, fear has become a daily companion. We might cry, along with the psalmist in Psalm 13, "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I bear pain in my soul and have sorrow in my heart all day long? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me?"

[Pause here. For we must acknowledge the pain that is happening within us and around us. Pause. This might be a long, long pause.] ... Now let us take a deep breath. Now let us move forward.

After we have named the deep wounds within us and across this nation; after we have confessed our grief, our weariness, and our complicity in the broken systems that bind us; after we have allowed the truth to settle in, let us remember that this is not the end of the story. As people of faith, we don't stop at despair and fear. We don't close our eyes or turn inward or try to protect ourselves from more pain. No. Instead we open our eyes, turn outward, and we rise to follow Jesus once more – into the very places and spaces where pain still lingers and where love is most needed.

How do we do this? As people saved by grace through Jesus, how do look outward and love our neighbor? Here are some ideas from a letter (https://www.lutheransnw.org/news/letter-from-elca-bishops) signed by many of the bishops that was published in October 2025. These ideas include:

- Pray for those who are vulnerable and for all who work for justice.
- Advocate in your communities, legislatures, and Congress for laws that protect migrants, advance racial justice, and safeguard LGBTQIA+ people.
- Engage in the holy work of hospitality, creating spaces of safety, affirmation, and belonging for all of God's children.
- Model respectful dialogue in a polarized world, seeking understanding rooted in love.
- Hold fast to hope, trusting that the Spirit is still at work renewing creation and reconciling the world to God.

As a guide to this holy work, I have always loved the story of Martin Luther who, when the plague was raging in Wittenberg, chose to stay in order to care for the sick and comfort the dying. We might sometimes think of Luther as curmudgeonly and argumentative. We might also think he was more concerned with being saved by grace through faith than loving his neighbor. But Luther's courage and pastoral care during the plague shows his heart and his response to God's amazing grace.

For during the plague, as people were dying around him, he stayed and cared and ministered. In 1527 he wrote, "We are bound to each other in such a way that no one may forsake the other in his distress but is obliged to assist and help him as he himself would like to be helped." ("Whether One May Flee from a Deadly Plague")

Above all things, let us not grow weary. Let us continue to hear the summons of Jesus. Let us continue to answer the call to love our neighbor – especially the most vulnerable. And, may we be the ones who, in a weary world, hope as the psalmist hopes at the end of Psalm 13: "But I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord because God has dealt bountifully with me."
