### Receive the Grace That Sustains Us

In my previous congregation, a longtime member was hospitalized over the course of many weeks. He'd had difficulty chewing and swallowing his food, so his diet was quite limited. When it became clear that he was in his final weeks, most of the dietary restrictions were lifted provided he took care while eating. When asked what he most wanted to eat, without hesitation he responded by saying "Lavash Bread" from his favorite restaurant. The nearest location was 30 minutes away, so his children called in the family's dinner order and brought back a feast for everyone in the room. I was privileged to witness their gathering as they literally encircled his bed and fed him tiny bites of that precious bread, which he thoroughly enjoyed. It was Communion in its truest sense.

I've reflected on that memory many times over the years, especially as Holy Week draws near. On Maundy Thursday – indeed every time we receive Communion, but we're more aware of it on this night – in a bit of bread and a sip of wine or juice, we receive the grace that sustains us day in and day out. And on Good Friday, as we walk the final steps of Jesus' life on earth, we're reminded that his death is not the end.

May these Holy Days bring you peace and comfort in the assurance that God has the final word, and that God's word is life. Thanks be to God!

# **Growing Young**

Ever since I started back in August of 2020, the question has been asked, "How do we get families back in church?" It was a difficult question to answer in the midst of a pandemic and only having met a few youth, let alone families. The question remained throughout the pandemic as we slowly started to connect, build relationships, and see each other inperson. About a year ago, when we started to move toward full in-person activities, the question was asked again in earnest. Through many conversations, it became apparent to me that we needed help to answer the question and find a solution. In the second half of 2022 I sought out resources that I thought would be helpful in guiding us to not just bring families back to church but would help to build and sustain a healthy and vibrant children, youth, and family ministry for many years to come. I found two incredible books that will help guide our congregation in moving forward: Sustainable Youth Ministry by Mark DeVries and Growing Young by Kara Powell, Jake Mulder, and Brad Griffin. Sustainable Youth Ministry provides an incredible guide and framework on how to build a ministry for the long term. Using the imagery of building a house the book sets forth processes and systems on how to build sustainable, healthy, and long-term children, youth, and family ministry. Growing Young provides six core commitments that the authors recommend congregations follow that have proven effective if they want to "grow young," meaning prioritizing young people and families. This book brings together over 10,000 hours of research alongside countless stories of how congregations have new life (for all ages, not just young families) through the six core commitments. These two books will provide a guide for healthy systems and culture and will be our guide as we navigate this process for Saint Andrew's. There will be many opportunities for conversation in the coming months as our team moves forward in the early steps of our own process. We ask that you keep our team in your prayers as we all work together to connect with families in our congregation and in our community.

# Isolation and Loneliness: A Nursing Perspective

Raise your hand if you have ever felt isolated or lonely. (My hand is up!) Although not entirely the same, isolation and loneliness are connected. Isolation occurs when a person has little or no contact with other people. Loneliness is an emotional state. When combined, there is increased potential for cognitive decline, depression, anxiety, and exacerbation of current health problems. It's worrisome. Not to mention, we're still recovering from a pandemic, which kept people at home, kids away from school and friends, increasing isolation and anxieties. We struggle to move forward, searching for a new normal.

#### Who's at risk?

- Not just the elderly, but those experiencing major life changes, relocations, grief and loss, trauma, health changes, including loss of hearing and sight, loss of independence.
- Adults and youth alike exhibiting increased anxiety, sadness, loss of interest in ordinary activities, declining grades, sleep disturbances, and disconnection from family and friends.

#### How can we help ourselves?

- Stay connected to people. Rely on church family, loved ones. Get comfortable asking for help!
- Strive for a healthy lifestyle in terms of diet, exercise, regular medical follow up. Get vaccinated.
- Practice gratitude! It's easy, it's free, resulting in increased health benefits, plus it lifts the spirits! The more you do it, the more automatic it becomes.
- Pray, meditate, listen to music. Join the choir. Volunteer! Possibilities are endless and it's fun.

#### How can we help others?

- Stay alert to those around us who may be spiraling into crisis. Offer to drive. Check on your neighbors. Offer a smile or hug, a pat on the back. Be a good (non-judgemental) listener.
- Learn to recognize a crisis event. Call 911 for imminent threat to life or safety, if someone is having difficulty breathing, is unconscious, discoloration of skin. Threat of immediate self harm or to others. Stay on scene until medical help arrives. Learn CPR if you don't know it.
- Call 988 if you or someone else is having suicidal thoughts or psychosis, require help with substance abuse issues, or if you or another is experiencing worsening depression or anxiety.



A Movie Suggestion: 12 Years a Slave



B ased on an incredible true story of one man's fight for survival and freedom. In the pre-Civil War United States, Solomon Northup, a free black man from upstate New York, is abducted and sold into slavery. Facing cruelty personified by a malevolent slave owner, as well as unexpected kindnesses, Solomon struggles not only to stay alive, but to retain his dignity. In the twelfth year of his unforgettable odyssey, Solomon's chance meeting with a Canadian abolitionist will forever alter his life.

# A Book Suggestion: Until I Am Free: Fannie Lou Hamer's Enduring Message to America by Keisha N, Blain



Ablend of social commentary, biography, and intellectual history, *Until I Am Free* is a manifesto for anyone committed to social justice. The book challenges us to listen to a working-poor and disabled Black woman activist and intellectual of the civil rights movement as we grapple with contemporary concerns around race, inequality, and social justice.

Despite her limited material resources and the myriad challenges as she endured as a Black woman living in poverty in Mississippi, Hamer committed herself to making a difference in the lives of others. She refused to be sidelined in the movement and refused to be intimidated by those of higher social status and with better jobs and education.

More than 40 years since Hamer's death in 1977, her words still speak truth to power, laying bare the faults in American society and offering valuable insights on how we might yet continue the fight

to help the nation live up to its core ideals of "equality and justice for all".

At the start, I found the writing a bit repetitive, but the story of this little-known woman activist and her fight for not just civil rights, but human rights, was well worth reading.

# From Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee

Irecently learned that the largest glacier between Mt. Rainier and Glacier Peak is no more. The Ireporter actually said that the glacier had died. Died. Gone. For thousands of years, the Hinman Glacier lived in the Washington Cascades providing much needed water to the Skykomish River. It is now gone.

A few months ago, my beloved dog, Gracie, died. She was thirteen. She was sick. It was time. But Gracie was with me through my cancer treatment, my children leaving home, my marriage ending, moving to a new city, beginning a new job, being in a new relationship ... and now she has died. She is now gone.

In this synod we recently had two churches close: Clearbrook Lutheran Church in Lynden and Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church in Concrete. There are additional congregations who are discerning closure in this synod. All these congregations thrived in their communities for many years. Baptisms, weddings, funerals happened. People heard, shared, and lived into the good news of Jesus. And now these congregations have either decided, or are discerning, if their time lifecycle has come to an end.

All of these deaths are hard. They hurt my heart. There is grief and there is pain. And, while I might not know what you are grieving, I am sure that there is heartache in your life, too. Sometimes it seems that there is so much death. And sometimes it seems overwhelming.

As Christians we might say, "But I thought we were promised immortality. I thought "death has lost its sting." Truthfully, it doesn't feel that way. Death is real. It hurts. Where is this resurrection and new life we are promised?"

Dr. Brian Bantum, professor and author, writes regarding human immortality:

Our personhood, the body we speak of so confidently that was meant to live forever, is itself an arrangement of cells and tissues that are cycling through life and death. Our bodies are constantly undergoing changes, small transformations in our gradual development from infant to adult. Our bodies are no different and are connected to the cycles of life and death that are intrinsic to creation's goodness. As Indigenous theologian Randy Woodley reminds us, 'Death is simply another part of living.' (*Christian Century, Did God intend for Adam and Eve to live forever?, March 12, 2023*)

On Ash Wednesday this year, I had a vision of God playing in the dirt. Kneeling down, mixing dirt into mud, molding and mixing, and forming each human. God – laughing and creating. God – loving and generating. I smiled at this sight. Later in the service, when I went forward to receive ashes in the shape of a cross upon my forehead, when I heard, "Dust to dust and ashes to ashes," I had a vision of God scooping each beloved human into God's arms at the end of their life. Holding the human turned dirt again. Loving and creating even more.

Dr. Bantum writes later in the same article, "Change, transformation, death, cycles of renewal and cessation—these are all part of God's creation. And this change is beautiful and good." Is it possible to move beyond the grief we feel when something ends and see the new life that might be coming?

Perhaps the glacier that died could be an impetus for us to take seriously the threat of climate change. I would hope so. I hope that the love my dog Gracie had for me will make me more loving towards others. In our synod, we are working with the closing congregations so that together we may begin new ministries and new ways of being church in this new day and age.

During this season of Lent – and into Holy Week and Easter – we know the truth of death. We know it in our bones. We acknowledge the pain, the difficulty, the fear, and the grief that comes with death. And yet, even more so, as people of faith, as people who celebrate Easter, we trust in God's love through Jesus Christ who died and rose again for us and for the redemption of this entire world. Yes. There is death. And yes. There is resurrection.

God continues to play in the soil. God continues to create and nurture new life. God continues to hold and sustain life. And, fundamentally, without question, God brings life from death - each and every day.

May you have a blessed Easter. May we together, in this real world that we live in, trust in Jesus. And may we, with all the angels, archangels and all the saints, shout the good news together, "Happy Easter! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!"

# At the March 13 Congregation Council Meeting....

Pastor Lara led a devotion on Luke 5:1-11.

#### **President Carolynn Ferris' Report:**

- Pastor Lara's goals have been finalized.
- Staff reviews and goal setting has been moved to the June/July timeframe. The reasons: 1) The church program year starts in the fall and ends in the summer, and setting goals shortly before the program year makes more sense than at the beginning of the calendar year; and 2) The time between December and June is hectic and challenging for staff. The review and goal setting process for Pastor Lara will also be moved to the summer months.
- Additional items can be found in President Carolynn Ferris' "President's Corner" report on page 12.

Congregations for the Homeless (CFH): The Council approved hosting the CFH Rotating Shelter in June.

**Personnel Handbook for Non-Rostered Employees:** Changes were made to clarify that part-time employees need to work a minimum of 30 per week to be eligible for benefits, and to add Juneteenth as a paid staff holiday. The updated Handbook with these changes was approved.

Pastor Lara Forbes' Report: The Northwest Washington Synod is having two Gatherings in lieu of a Synod Assembly. One gathering is on May 20 at Saint Andrew's. Council members are encouraged to help and/or attend.

#### Youth and Family Ministries:

- Director of Youth and Family Ministries Director Doug Johnson updated the Council on the work being done to reimagine Youth and Family Ministries. He shared results of a questionnaire that Discipleship Ministries Committee members and Council members had completed. He reviewed the two books that will be used as models for moving forward. See the "Growing Young" article on page 6 for more information.
- Council members Aaron Davis and Ann Ross-Clarke requested Council members to sign up to participate in youth events for the remainder of the program year.

Council Retreat: The Congregation Council shared feedback from their retreat on March 11 and discussed next steps. **Finance:** See Treasurer Bill Brueggemann's "Treasurer Notes" on page 13.

- A Task Force is being formed to look at long-term facility leases.
- Finance staff and volunteers from five cluster congregations are meeting quarterly to explore collaboration opportunities.

### President's Corner

Greetings to my fellow brothers and sisters in Christ!

#### 2023 Council Retreat

On Saturday, March 11, the Council spent four invigorating hours brainstorming ideas around how we might imagine "doing church" in new and impactful ways. We looked at everything from Music and Worship, to Adult Education, to Youth and Family, to Outreach and Servant Ministries. We talked about how we might better support our committees and how we need to be more creative and energetic as we face our future and figure out what God might have in store for us. Council Liaisons will be reaching out to their committees to share some of the ideas generated – there is no intent to dictate change, just begin a conversation about where there might be different ways to share our abundance. We all came away excited and energized about the possibilities ahead. There will be more to come!

#### **CFH Rotating Shelter**

We have learned that the church where the Congregations for the Homeless (CFH) Rotating Shelter typically goes in June has shut down, so CFH is looking for a new home that month. It was suggested that we invite the men back this June and change our typical hosting month to June going forward. This will eliminate the conflict with Lenten Soup Suppers and worship, minimize heating costs, and allow us to possibly host a BBQ for the men in the warmer months. Cheryl Jurrus has already recruited volunteers and other churches to support the men once again in June. On March 13, Council voted unanimously to approve this action.

#### Saint Andrew's Committee Review

One of the topics that Council discussed was around our various committees. It is apparent that some committees have had a difficult time recruiting both leadership and/or committee members and that it might be time to take a fresh look at how we best accomplish the objectives of a few of the committees. I have asked Dan Johnson to act as a "Committee Liaison At Large". His role is to check in with each committee chair, Council Liaison, and stakeholders to provide Council with an objective view of what is working well and where there might be an opportunity to improve on effectiveness. This will take some time and healthy dialogue, but we hope the efforts will be worth it.

### February and March Cluster Council President Meetings

On February 21, I hosted a call with the Council presidents from Cross of Christ, Saint Luke's, Sammamish Hills and Mount Si Lutheran Churches. We held a robust discussion about how we might carry forth the idea of greater collaboration between our churches. We talked about the possibility of sharing and/or leveraging resources of staff, property, programs, and pastoral care. We decided that the best next step would be to set up a meeting with church leaders (Presidents and Executive Committees) and pastors and possibly a representative from the Synod to brainstorm ideas and develop an action plan if there was a consensus to continue this work. We all felt very excited about the possibilities before us.

On March 7, we had another Cluster leadership call, but Anh Le from Holy Cross was the only one who called in. Their church in Factoria has entered into an agreement with Habitat for Humanity to redevelop their property. Once the project is completed, there will be a community space that could be used as a worship center if needed. It is likely that Holy Cross will have to vacate their premises early in January 2024 to accommodate the construction. Anh and I talked extensively about how he might manage this time of great change. I extended an invitation to have their congregants visit Saint Andrew's in the coming months to see if their members could feel comfortable worshiping in our space.

# Ministry of the Month for April ~ Lantern Hill

Gracious and merciful God,

Great Teacher, children need an education to have the full and abundant life You came to give them. Your Word demonstrates how You touch people's hearts to spur them to action for their own personal growth and betterment. Bless the children living in poverty by providing them nourishment and a safe and positive space to thrive and learn, that they may apply their education to help lift themselves and their families out of poverty — for this generation and generations to come. Amen.



#### Background on the Ministry with Lantern Hill~

Lantern Hill is a non-profit organization with roots in the ELCA Lutheran church. Lantern Hill was founded by JJ and Abby Williams in 2007 and has evolved over the years into an education and feeding program that follows students through their educational careers and ensures that they stay in school and graduate.

Lantern Hill is called Linterna del Camino and is an Educational Community Center in Canon Buena Vista, Mexico (outside of Ensenada) that provides tutoring, feeding programs, youth programs, special events, and a summer school. The Mexican staff works year-round with the students. Lantern Hill provides for their education needs, school tuition, school supplies and uniforms.

The LH mission statement is: Breaking the cycle of poverty through education, nutrition and care. We believe it is through these things that lives can change and families can break out of the cycle of poverty.

Saint Andrew's involvement with Lantern Hill began in 2019 with the mission trip that sent the "Mexico 12", a mix of adults and high school youth, to spend time living amongst and working with the staff and children there. It was such a positive and influential experience, that as a group we felt strongly that the mission and the people served needed their story to be told, our experience shared, and that efforts could be made to continue supporting them financially. Additionally, Shana Nielsen became a board member of the Friends of Lantern Hill in January 2020, and she and her family have since returned to Lantern Hill to serve and represent Saint Andrew's.

### Current Opportunities to Support Lantern Hill:

Support looks differently based on where a child is in their educational journey. Younger children are receiving up to three nutritious meals per week, which for some is their only meal of the day. All students receive tutoring from university certified educators (all local community members). Historically in this community, the average education level did not exceed the equivalent of 6th grade. "Kids" attending middle school, high school, or university must test in and be accepted, are required to wear uniforms (which LH helps to fund to ensure a child is not excluded for lack of appropriate attire), and for high school and university students, provision of bus fare, as students average a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hour bus ride (one way) to get to the nearest schools. In addition, there are plans to purchase a building across the street from the school that will be renovated to allow for a safe play and creative space, (currently there is not such a place), as well as an empty lot that will be used as a teaching/experiential garden to grow fruits and vegetables for the school's feeding program.

#### Latest Information:


Currently there are 100 children, ages 4-22 (including 4 in university, 1 in medical school), receiving educational and related support. This is the highest number of students ever served with more challenges than ever due to the ongoing repercussions from Covid. Monetary support provides financial security needed to sustain the mission for long term success. We have been so very thankful for your loving care of Lantern Hill, your prayers for the safety, health and well-being of the staff, children and their families, and for your financial support. We look forward to sharing more about Lantern Hill in the coming months. # Collection Emphasis for Hopelink ~ April

The Hopelink Food Bank tries hard to provide the items needed and desired by the 1700 households they support. As we partner with them, they have come to ask us for items that they don't usually get



donated. The families they support would like to be able to do some baking, but baking supplies are not typically donated.

So, for April we are collecting "Baking Makings" –sugar and flour. And to support this baking - salt, baking soda, baking powder and some typical baking items. To support as many households as possible, they ask for specific size packages. The "foods" for April are:

- Sugar (white in 4-pound bags or brown in 1- or 2-pound packages)
- Flour (wheat or white in 5-pound bags or gluten free options almond, coconut, all-purpose gluten free)
- Baking Soda (1-pound box)
- Baking Powder (about 8 ounce)
- Salt (about 26 ounce)
- Chocolate chips
- Cocoa powder
- Vanilla extract (or other extracts)
- Yeast









# The Plaster House, Tanzania Exciting News from The Plaster House

r. Brown and Dr. Bakker's teams, plastic surgeon teams from Denver, have just done anzania about 70 surgeries on children's lips and palates and burn scar contractures with a added focus on hand surgery. Surgeries were done at Mt. Meru Hospital, the local governmental regional hospital. As a result, there are 90 children in our temporary home in Themi Hill, Arusha. This month they will start surgeries on children with neglected clubfoot at the Nkoranga and NSK hospitals. Using area hospitals for surgeries is part of our new five-year expansion plan. Most exciting is that next week they will be treating children with fluorosis, working with the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre (KCMC) which is owned and operated by the ELCT in Moshi. We pray for **Esupat Kimirei** as the new day-to-day boss of the Themi Hill campus. She earned a bachelors degree at Concordia College (Moorhead, MN) and has served many years as the director of outreach, locating children in the interior areas who can be treated.

# MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania

Last fall 70 girls from across Tanzania were brought to the Maasae Girls Lutheran Secondary School to begin their Pre-Form One studies. They've been taught many subjects, especially English, in preparation for starting Form

One which began in January. One young lady's education is being sponsored by the "Dr. Seth Msinjili Endowed Scholarship," the recently retired headmaster of the school. As she completes her education, another young lady will be chosen to receive this scholarship, a gift of perpetuity to honor the life work of Dr. Msinjili.

Five of the original seventy from the new class have been sent to attend classes at Moringe Sokoine Secondary School, just down the road in Monduli. These young women come from safe homes of "understanding parents", meaning they are at little or no risk of being taken from campus and do not need the extra shelter provided by MGLSS.

In case you hadn't heard, the exam results are in for the Form 5 entrance exam taken in late October of 2022. Of the 67 young ladies who took the exam, 65 passed! This is the largest number of girls to pass the Form 5 entry exam in the history of the Maasae Girls School. Operation Bootstrap Africa (OBA) is proud of these young women and can't wait to see the things they accomplish. **Pray** for them as they wait to start Form 5 next July, especially that they may stay safe and not become pregnant or married. This is a precarious time for them.

# Helping the People Affected by the Earthquakes in Turkey and Syria

On February 6 two powerful earthquakes, one a magnitude 7.8 and the second a magnitude 7.5, hit Turkey and significantly impacted neighboring Syria. The two quakes devastated both countries, killing thousands of people and collapsing thousands of buildings. Another quake hit on February 20. At this time, financial gifts are the number one need to assist our neighbors who are injured, hungry, and displaced from these quakes.

In response, the Outreach and Servant Ministries Committee decided to send \$1,000 from the New Opportunities fund to Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR), directed to their Middle East Crisis fund. LDR is already working with organizations in Turkey and Syria to provide immediate aid, and will help coordinate a comprehensive response as the full extent of the impact becomes clearer.
