#### Presence and Peace

While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him.... When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them.

Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him.... Luke 24:13-35

The story of the Road to Emmaus is one of my favorites in all of scripture. It's foundational for the ELCA's mission philosophy, so it was a big part of my life during the time I served in Costa Rica. At its core, it's about the physical proximity of the risen Christ to the disciples – meeting them where they were and accompanying them along their way.

This story came to life for me after I'd been in Costa Rica for about a month. I was still adjusting to life in a new place and learning what my job was all about. I was homesick, and I didn't really want to be there. I knew that Jesus was with me, but it didn't feel like it.

That changed one afternoon, though, when I visited one of the urban churches that I served. At that time, the church building and adjacent parsonage were made of corrugated metal attached to a wooden frame. From the outside, it looked more like a large shack than a place where people lived and worshipped.

But when I stepped inside, there was a presence and a peace that I didn't expect to feel – and I recognized it right away. And I remember feeling relieved and thinking, "I'm home."

When the disciples left Jerusalem on that first Easter afternoon, they hadn't seen the risen Christ yet so, as far as they were concerned, the resurrection didn't happen. So they went to Emmaus, a place they knew was safe and secure. As they walked, the risen Christ met them on their way, listening to them as he accompanied them. In the moment he made himself known, it was through an act so simple and, at the same time, so familiar that they almost missed it.

Afterwards, they couldn't wait to get back to Jerusalem to proclaim to the others that they'd seen the risen Christ. But Jesus' resurrection isn't the end of the story. He shaped the identity of the disciples and was made known in them as they went out and continued his teachings and ministry in the world.

The risen Christ continues to be made known today. He shapes who we are as individuals, and he forms the common link between each of us in our congregation. His presence is what allows us to accompany one another and be a community. He reminds us of who we are, and that he's with us wherever we happen to be – accompanying us along our way.

As we continue in this Easter season, may the presence of the risen Christ bring peace to your life. May you know that the story of Jesus is made known in you.

#### Communion Distribution

In a previous announcement communicated in Sunday bulletins and *Trendings* enews, the Worship and Liturgical Arts Committee (WLA) and Pastor Lara shared that we would begin a hybrid approach for receiving Communion starting on Sunday, **May 7**. As promised, here are the details.

To honor all of the requests that we've gotten about receiving Communion, we will receive at the rail on the first, third, and fifth Sundays of the month. We will receive continuously (as we've been doing) on the second and fourth Sundays of the month, and also on festival Sundays and worship services, such as Easter and Christmas.

Every Sunday, we will continue to commune the east and west sides of the Sanctuary simultaneously so that you receive Communion on the side in which you are seated. The ushers will continue to guide this process. On the Sundays that we receive at the rail, you are invited to kneel or stand at the rail – whichever is comfortable – on the side in which you are seated. For safety reasons, the back sides of the rail (closest to the choir and musicians) will not be available for kneeling or standing to receive Communion.

We expect that there will be a period of adjustment; however, we do view this as the best way to accommodate everyone's wishes. Thank you, again, for your patience and understanding as we work to provide a meaningful worship experience for all.

## Healing Prayer during Communion

Healing Prayers during Holy Communion are offered on the third Sunday of the month. The next date is on Sunday, May 21.

Our Healing Prayer Ministers are ready to pray for your requests for healing (yourself or someone else), thanksgiving, or a stressful situation.

We have one Healing Prayer station (kneeler) on the side of the Sanctuary near the organ.

You will be asked if you would like to be anointed with oil at the end of the prayer.

## **Update on Covid-related Practices**

ith the expiration of all Washington state public health emergency restrictions on April 11, all remaining restrictions still in place at Saint Andrew's have been discontinued. These include:

- Hand sanitizer for the congregation before communion
- Masking requirements for communion servers
- Masking suggestion for greeters and ushers
- Any distancing requirements
- · Highest velocity air exchange

Anyone who wishes to continue masking is welcome to do so. Masks and hand sanitizer remain available in the Narthex for those who want to use them. The back rows in the section that was previously reserved for distancing (the far section on the east side of the Sanctuary) remain as "suggested masks and distancing." The rest of the section is seating as in the rest of the Sanctuary.

Hand sanitizer remains on the altar to be used by all Communion servers prior to distribution.

All are welcome, and we'll have a reception afterward, so come and enjoy with your family without having to come up with big dinner plans!

Louise Farrenc's large scale Piano Trio in E-flat, written in the classical style, will delight and intrigue audience members. The trio was composed by the virtuoso pianist in the years before she was appointed Professor of Piano at the Paris Conservatoire, a prestigious position despite the pay difference between Farrenc and her male counterparts. Eventually Farrenc's demand for equal pay was met, and she stayed in this position for 30 years.

Lili Boulanger's D'un matin de printemps ("Of a Spring Morning") was one of the final pieces she completed during her tragically short life. She died of intestinal tuberculosis at 24, while her sister Nadia Boulanger went on to become one of Europe's most celebrated composition teachers and lived until age 92. D'un matin de printemps is an energetic and blustery welcome to spring!

Jennifer Higdon's Pale Yellow and Fiery Red offer a deep dive into the intersection between music and color. Higdon was influenced at an early age by rock and folk music, and had little exposure to the classical music world until she joined her high school band, playing percussion and flute. She rose quickly in the compositional world through her college and graduate school studies and until recently served on the composition faculty at Curtis Institute of Music. Her Letters for the Future album won a 2023 Grammy Award.

Amy Beach's Piano Trio, Op. 150 is at turns meditative and invigorating, and always imaginative and Romantic. Beach was among the earliest American-educated women to find success as a virtuoso pianist and composer. After her husband's death in 1910, she spent several years in Europe, where she was also greeted with acceptance and appreciation

Florence Price's Art Song "Night," arranged for piano trio by the Merz Trio, lends a calming farewell to our program. Florence Price, an extremely gifted and hard-working African American composer born in 1887, overcame a great deal of discrimination and adversity to bring her works to the public.

## Loss and Grief: Rediscovering Joy

Bereavement, loss and grief. Something we don't like to think or talk about, but it's an inevitable part of life, isn't it? Loss comes in many ways. ie: death of a loved one, be it a spouse, child, sibling, parent, grandparent, friend, co-worker, unexpected or anticipated. It also occurs in divorce/separation, loss of a pet, loss of health, or a job. Grief is a normal and healthy response to loss. If we love, we will grieve. No matter if you are the bereaved or supporting a loved one experiencing loss and grief, life is never quite the same. But it is possible to move forward with life, with hope and anticipation. Possibly even joy!

#### How can we help ourselves?

- Recognize you are not alone. Intense grieving might last for 6 months or years. It's different for everyone. When grief is new it is normal to feel numb like you are trapped in the wrong body, exhausted spiritually, mentally and physically. Seek out support groups or grief counselors, particularly for worsening depression or difficulty in managing daily activities. Stay connected to those around you, your loved ones and church family. God intends for us to share our grief. It helps lessen the load. Crying, reliving events, retelling your story helps the healing process. Don't hold back on the tears. Crying is also a known stress reliever.
- Practice self care. Getting adequate sleep is critical. Continue meds, prescribed medical treatment plans, including a healthy diet. Try journaling, or even "writing letters" to your loved one.
- Get out for a walk, a bike ride, rake leaves. Exercise stimulates those "feel good" hormones and lifts the spirits, at least temporarily. Surround yourself with your pets.
- Moving forward and enjoying life does not mean you have forgotten that person. We never forget. It's okay to hang on to a loved one's belongings, be it clothes hanging in the closet, keeping a child's room intact, maintaining your husband's/wife's desk as he/she left it. You will know when the time is right to make changes.
- For worsening depression or if you are thinking of self harm, call the Crisis Call Center at 775-784-8090.

#### What can we do to help others who are grieving?

- Sometimes there are no words, and your presence is enough. In time you can say, "Do you feel like talking?"

  Be willing to listen to the same repetitive stories, such as how their loved one died. It's part of processing the loss.

  Comments like, "you need to get over it", "It was God's will", "It's time to move forward", although usually spoken in good faith, are often not helpful.
- Be there for the bereaved when others have moved on. Acknowledge their loved one on special occasions, particularly date of death anniversaries. There is fear he/she might be forgotten.
- Encourage the bereaved to channel their grief into empathy and support of others, particularly towards those who are experiencing the same.

## There is hope.

Grief teaches us important life lessons. How to be more compassionate and sympathetic. It reminds us we are not alone during difficult times. It also creates resilience, strength, even empowerment.

#### John 16: 20, 22:

"Very truly I tell you, you will weep and mourn while the world rejoices. You will grieve, but your grief will turn to joy. Now is your time of grief, but I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy."

#### **KnitWits**

Saint Andrew's KnitWits (Knitting as Witnesses) is a fellowship group whose primary mission is to provide items of comfort that are knit or crocheted. Their on-going projects include prayer shawls, baptismal blankets, lapghans, baby blankets, baby booties, chemo caps, hats, wash cloths, sweaters, and scarves. The work of the KnitWits' hands keeps many people warm and reminds them that someone cares.

#### Saint Andrew's Committee Review

Dan Johnson is leading the Council initiative to evaluate the functioning of our various committees. We know that some are doing quite well, while others seem to be struggling. He plans to meet with each committee – either at one of their meetings or, if that is not feasible, with representatives from the committee. Ideally, all of these meetings will also include the Council Liaison. Dan has prepared a series of questions that are intended to guide a conversation around what is working, where there might be challenges and provide an opportunity to think creatively how we might more effectively accomplish the mission of each committee. He is hoping to have the first round of interviews completed by the end of June.

#### Finnish Lutheran Church

Earlier this year, the Seattle Finnish Lutheran Church reached out to Saint Andrew's about using our Sanctuary to hold a couple of "trial" services to better meet the needs of their congregants who live on the Eastside. They held these services on a Sunday afternoon in February, March, and April. They are now interested in continuing this effort in May with the possibility of making this a longer-term effort. They reimburse us for the use of the facility (\$250 per service) plus a direct payment for those who assist them with livestreaming or the sound system. There will be more conversations around how we can help them in their ministry while ensuring that the interests of Saint Andrew's are in alignment.

#### Facility Use Task Force

Bill Brueggemann has formed a "Facility Use Task Force" to review our policies and establish consistent procedures for organizations and individuals that may be interested in using our building and property. As a Council, we have discussed our interest in encouraging the use of our facilities by the broader community. Bill has asked that we formalize our intent by creating a statement that articulates this vision. We discussed and voted on this in our April Council meeting. See below.

#### Cluster Leadership Meeting - April 29

We have scheduled a brainstorming meeting with the leadership of the churches within our Cluster on the morning of Saturday, April 29. These churches include Saint Andrew's, Saint Luke's, Sammamish Hills, Cross of Christ, Holy Cross, and Mount Si. We have invited the Pastors, Council Presidents, and the Executive Committees for each church to participate in some "what if" conversations around greater collaboration and sharing of resources. Sammamish Hills Lutheran Church has volunteered to host the event which will run from 9:00 am – 12:00 noon. <u>All</u> are welcome to participate to share ideas and perspectives.



# Ministry of the Month for May ~ KidVantage

#### Opportunities to support KidVantage (formerly known as Eastside Baby Corner):

KidVantage, formerly Eastside Baby Corner, helps children have what they need to grow, play, learn and thrive. They do this by providing essential care, safety, and health goods for children who are experiencing the stresses of economic insecurity, systemic inequities, or family disruption.

Over the last couple of years, KidVantage has seen a significant increase in the number of households depending on them to provide basic needs to ensure healthy happy children. These items include free diapers/wipes, formula, clothing, car seats, household goods (sheets/towels/blankets), school supplies and enrichment through toys, books, and crafts. Diapers are so expensive for some families that they resort to hanging disposable diapers on the clothesline to reuse them.

KidVantage's 9<sup>th</sup> Annual Diaper Derby starts May 5 and goes through June 9. Their goal is to collect 175,000 diapers. Saint Andrew's traditionally has a "horse" in this race and this year is no exception. Our Derby horse name is **Dandy Andy** if you want to follow the progress. There are a couple of ways that you can help:

- You can donate diapers and wipes through the Corner of Blessing. They will be delivered to KidVantage by June 9 to get included in the Diaper Derby.
- You can make a donation to help purchase the diapers/wipes that they will distribute to needy families. ## Some Background on KidVantage:

KidVantage, formerly called Eastside Baby Corner, was founded in 1990 by Karen Ridlon. Her background as a pediatric nurse practitioner gave her insight into what kids need for healthy development and what families need to care for their children. With a broken playpen, a few other donated items, grit, determination, and a community network, Karen started KidVantage. Over the past 31 years, KidVantage has grown from Karen's dining room to three locations in King and Kitsap counties.

More than 80 school districts, health and human service organizations, early learning centers, and food banks are in the KidVantage collaborative network.

Kids, ages birth through 12, get shoes, diapers, formula, blankets, coats, toys, and much more from KidVantage and service partners. KidVantage also provides for expectant and postpartum mothers, supplying maternity wear, personal care goods, and mother-infant support items. Kids are warm, healthy, safe and better prepared to fulfill their own potential.

## for the Maasae Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), to hire a Farm Manager

Why?" you ask. After 25 years of fairly weak farm management, Operation Bootstrap Africa (OBA) has asked the Saint Andrew's Tuesday Morning Men's (TMM) group to raise the salary for a trained manager on the almost 400-acre plot of land on which the Girls School rests. For years the farm has raised some of the food needed, but OBA thinks the farm could produce enough food to feed the girls and produce enough coffee to also provide a cash crop. For many years the farm has been managed by the Heads of School, but their focus was always on the girls, farming was a distant second. OBA approached the Saint Andrew's men's group to raise \$10,000. Half of that money is from an anonymous source, so we need to raise only \$5,000. We have gathered \$3300, but we're \$1,700 short. Please, can you help us?

## The Plaster House, Tanzania

The Plaster House was 15 years old this month! Executive Director and Founder Sarah Rejman wrote, "it's not about counting the years – it's about what they have done to make those years count." They've treated nearly 10,000 children, and counting. . . Think of the ripple effect:

- how many other people each of these 10,000 lives will touch
- what became possible for these children that otherwise would not have been.
- what it felt like for a child to experience acceptance, hope, and healing. . . for the first time.

They have taken a momentous rite of passage by becoming more independent as a non-profit organization in Tanzania so that they can expand their 'high love – low cost' treatment to other areas of Tanzania, to government facilities as well as those under the Evangelical Lutheran Church Tanzania (ELCT) and their 26 Diocese. They ask for our prayers as they put all the pieces together, a five-year plan that will include five area surgical hospitals. They have already begun to partner with the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre in Moshi, and ELCT project. As they expand, however, they continue to treat children at their Arusha site, needing whatever financial help you can share to keep the healing process going.

## MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania

Things are going well at MGLSS. Seventy new Form 1 students began their schooling in January of this year. Of those seventy girls, fifty-three are still in need of sponsors. Form 6 graduation is going to be held on May 6 and 16 young ladies will walk in the ceremony. Form 6 National Examinations start on May 2 and go until May 22, 2023. Results will not be available until late July at the earliest.

There are many special projects currently underway. Monduli is finally seeing some rain! After a severe drought that prohibited the campus from using drip irrigation, they are now getting the system back online, and the water catchment barrels should help with that process. The recently hired farm manager is interseeding the coffee, which will allow the farmers to use plants that are genetically identical to those first sown on the campus 100 years ago.

Finally, the new teacher housing has been a great success: the renovation of unused farm storage buildings. Three teachers and their families have settled into their new homes and are very satisfied with the quality and comfort of the space. More teacher housing continues to be the major construction projects at MGLSS. Operation Bootstrap-Africa (OBA) donors were generous enough to fund the renovation of each teacher house on campus. We can't wait to see how they turn out.

Saint Andrew's supports MGLSS in a variety of ways. Many Saint Andrew's members individually support girls in the MGLSS scholarship program with either full or half scholarships. These scholarships are important for the girls to continue their education.
