Summer Themes

But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity. Amen. 2 Peter 3:18

When we introduced the Narrative Lectionary (NL) last fall, one of the things that excited us about it was the opportunity for different series and themes in the summer months. This year, we will use the suggested series from Luther Seminary, the creator of the NL: four weeks in Isaiah, three weeks in 2 Peter, four weeks exploring Old Testament Wisdom and Poetry, and we'll conclude with three weeks studying the Creeds.

As we alternate between the Old and New Testaments, we'll hear stories and readings that are familiar. Most of them appear in the Sunday readings at some point, but some do not. Each series will allow us to examine the author, the context in which the stories were written, and the way(s) they apply to us today.

The readings from Isaiah begin with his response to God's call, "Here am I, send me." The readings that follow tell of God's people's experience of judgment and the eventual promise of redemption. More importantly, though, they tell of God's presence during Zion's national suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension. In other words, God never abandons God's people.

In 2 Peter, we are reminded of the importance of knowing God – that that knowledge (that is, our faith) is our foundation in a world that competes for our attention. Our foundation is not static, however. In the words of our mission statement, it allows us to grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

The series on Old Testament Wisdom and Poetry gives us an overview of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon. Walking us through trusting the Lord with all our heart, the creation of Wisdom as the first act of the Lord, a reminder that for everything there is a season, and concluding with a beautiful love poem, these readings offer a perspective on God that is often overlooked.

The Creeds are one of the pillars of our faith, expressing the core of what we believe. The readings for this series will explore the articles of the Creeds, not focusing on either the Apostles' or the Nicene, but rather the essence of the individual articles – God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Each week of this series will also feature a different wording of the Creeds during worship.

As we venture into these series, may they deepen our understanding of scripture – and provoke more questions about it.

Sanctuary Refresh

The Worship and Liturgical Arts Committee (WLA) is excited to share we have re-started our Sanctuary refresh project with designated (donor directed) funds that we received in 2019. You may recall that we were set to start this project prior to the pandemic shutdown and were not able to continue until now. The overall scope of the project, which will be done in stages, is to update the look and feel of the Sanctuary with more of a nod toward an extension of the view from our beautiful windows using different mediums and lighter colored wood tones in a few new furnishings to replace worn or temporary ones. WLA worked with Judy Gowdy, an interior designer, to develop these overall design principles. It is WLA's vision to use Sanctuary furnishings to help tell the story of what we believe as Christians. All of these pieces are intended to work together and be of similar design, to tell that story.

Communion Distribution

We have begun a hybrid approach for receiving Holy Communion, and believe this honors all of the requests that we've gotten about receiving Communion.

- We receive at the rail on the first, third, and fifth Sundays of the month.

 You are invited to kneel or stand at the rail whichever is comfortable on the side in which you are seated. For safety reasons, the back sides of the rail (closest to the choir and musicians) are not available for kneeling or standing to receive Communion.
- We receive continuously on the second and fourth Sundays of the month, and also on festival Sundays and worship services, such as Easter and Christmas.

Every Sunday, we commune the east and west sides of the Sanctuary simultaneously so that you receive Communion on the side in which you are seated. The ushers guide this process.

We view this as the best way to accommodate everyone's wishes. Thank you, again, for your patience and understanding as we work to provide a meaningful worship experience for all.

Healing Prayer during Communion

Healing Prayers during Holy Communion are offered on the third Sunday of the month. The next date is on Sunday, **June 18**.

Our Healing Prayer Ministers are ready to pray for your requests for healing (yourself or someone else), thanksgiving, or a stressful situation.

We have one Healing Prayer station (kneeler) on the side of the Sanctuary near the organ.

You will be asked if you would like to be anointed with oil at the end of the prayer.

Stay Healthy during Smoke Season!

Tildfire smoke will likely occur again this summer. Be proactive and take steps now to protect yourself. Breathing in smoke is not good for anyone. Days of consistent smoke exposure can take a toll on your health, making it especially important to protect yourself and those around you by staying alert and doing what you can to reduce smoke exposure.

When it's smokey outside, track air quality levels on the Washington Smoke Information website and follow related health recommendations. Also beware if there is any accidental release of toxic fumes.



Do your best to stay indoors and keep air clean by:

- Closing windows and doors unless it's too hot to maintain safe temperature inside.
- Filtering indoor air, which is the best way to stay safe, especially during extended periods of smoke. You can do this using an HVAC system, HEPA portable air cleaner, or DIY box fan filter.
- Do not add to indoor air pollution, such as smoking or burning candles.
- Setting air conditioning units to recirculate.
- Limit outside physical activity and wear a property fitting mask, like an N95.

Minor symptoms include eye, nose and throat irritation, headaches, wheezing, coughing and shortness of breath. More serious symptoms include difficulty breathing, chest pain and irregular heartbeat. Seek medical attention if your symptoms are severe.



A Movie Suggestion: The Hate You Give



A Book Suggestion: Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man by Emmanuel Acho



In *Uncomfortable Conversations With a Black Man*, Acho takes on all the questions, large and small, insensitive and taboo, many white Americans are afraid to ask—yet which all Americans need the answers to, now more than ever. With the same open-hearted generosity that has made his video series a phenomenon, Acho explains the vital core of such fraught concepts as white privilege, cultural appropriation, and "reverse racism." In his own words, he provides a space of compassion and understanding in a discussion that can lack both. He asks only for the reader's curiosity—but along the way, he will galvanize all of us to join the antiracist fight.

Northwest Washington Synod

In 1994, the ELCA adopted a social message entitled, *Community Violence*. This social message acknowledges that the causes of violence are complex and pervasive and that violence breeds violence. This social message raises these questions:

In the face of this, what are we as a church called to be and do? What resources of our faith can we bring to bear on this apparently intractable predicament? How shall we respond to both victims and perpetrators of violence? What shall we do in cooperation with others as together we seek to counter violence in our communities?



As I write this, we have had more mass shootings in the United States than days of the year (mass shootings are defined as an incident in which four or more victims are shot or killed). The sheer volume of these killings naturally brings up the questions above – how do we respond?

First, we are called to pray. We are called to pray individually and collectively. We are called to pray for the victims of violence and for the loved ones of those harmed. We are called to pray that justice might come, for reconciliation and for peace. We are called to pray in repentance that we are not paralyzed in fear or hatred or numbness. I confess that I do not like memes that make fun of people saying, "thoughts and prayers." My siblings in Christ, we are called to pray as people of faith! But prayer is not an excuse to do nothing. Through prayer, we are called to action.

Second, we are called to prayerfully enter into hard conversation about this issue with one another – in love and grace and accountability. Have someone directly affected by gun violence come and speak – a trauma doctor, a school counselor, a parent, a social worker. While I know some people would rather come to church to take refuge from the world and not engage the world, we, as siblings in Christ, grow in peace and understanding when we carefully listen and learn. When we are faced with difficult decisions or situations, the Holy Spirit gathers diverse people together to challenge one another and to discern where God is calling us to be as people who follow Jesus.

Third, we are called to advocate – especially for those without voice. Provide and call attention to resources and services that prevent violence, racism, and hate. Work individually in your own life to learn more about how systems of oppression lead to violence and humbly learn and practice. Partner with other congregations, churches, interfaith communities, and organizations to have a larger voice toward peace and justice. The advocacy arm of the NWWA Synod is Faith Action Network. Go to their website (www.fanwa.org) and see how to be engaged. For other resources, I encourage you to go to https://www.elca.org/60days and download "A 60-Day Journey Toward Justice in a Culture of Gun Violence."

Fourth, we are called to treat each person as a child of God. We choose life or death every day in our words and in our actions. Fundamentally, as Lutherans, we believe that the good news of Jesus Christ has redeemed each one of us. So how do we live and move and be in this world with such good news?

Pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer writes in The Cost of Discipleship, "Words and thoughts are not enough. Doing good involves all the things of daily life. 'If your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink' (Romans 12:20). In the same ways that brothers and sisters stand by each other in times of need, bind up each other's wounds, ease each other's pain, love of the enemy should do good to the enemy. Where in the world is there greater need, where are deeper wounds and pain than those of our enemies? Where is doing good more necessary and more blessed than for our enemies?"

As your Bishop, I pray that through God's Holy Spirit, we may work together toward peace, toward justice, toward understanding, and toward the end of violence in all forms, especially, in this day and time, the end of gun violence.

Trusting in God's grace, we pray, we listen, we advocate, we act.

Lay Ministry Formation

The Synod is excited to announce that it is launching a Lay Ministry Formation process for the Northwest Washington Synod.

Why Lay Ministry Formation?

In 1 Corinthians we read, "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit." As baptized children of God, we all have amazing callings – given to us by God for the good of the world. Has the church spent a disproportionate amount of time, resources, and energy centered on clergy and not enough on how God might be revealed through the diversity of all of God's children? Intentional focus on Lay Ministry Formation is an attempt to help find a better balance and real opportunities for Christ to minister to us, and we to each other, in maybe unexpected but renewing ways.

What is Lay Ministry Formation?

Our new Lay Ministry Formation is a cohort-based, committed journey for our lay leaders to discern and deepen their calling as a minister in context. The two-year formation process engages the Christian tradition through Biblical and theological frames, contextual realities, and practical functions of congregational and community life. This certificate program provides a hybrid learning environment of in-person retreats, online small groups, and guided reflection. In the process, participants grow in their own spiritual calling alongside professionally trained scholars and reflective practitioners. Cost of the program is to be determined.

Who might be interested?

This program is open to any congregational lay leaders wishing to discern their own call to ministry or who wish to grow deeper in their callings around practical intersections of faith and love of God.

**Although this program is open to all lay leaders, it is required for those seeking to become a Synodically Authorized Lay Minister (SALM), serving local churches as lay ministers as authorized by the Office of the Bishop.

Where can I find more information?

There are two upcoming informational meetings where we will discuss in greater detail the process, curriculum, and rationale for what the Lay Ministry Formation process is all about. Saint Andrew's Committee Review

Dan Johnson is leading the Council initiative to evaluate the functioning of our various committees. He has carried out several interviews / conversations with representatives from many of the committees already. He hopes to complete the remaining meetings by sometime in June and produce a report on his findings. The Council will then review this input and, along with committee leadership, develop plans for appropriate next steps wherever needed.

2023 Semi-Annual Meeting

We have scheduled the Semi-Annual meeting for **Sunday**, **June 4**. We will hold the meeting in-person just after the Sunday worship hour. The meeting will be in-person but will also be available via live Zoom or in a recorded Zoom format. We do not anticipate the need to take any votes from the congregation, it will be primarily a time to update everyone on various topics. The agenda will likely include:

- 1) Financial Update
- 2) Sanctuary Refresh Project Update
- 3) Report out on work with the Cluster

Cluster leadership Meeting - April 29

On Saturday morning, April 29, representatives from Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ, Sammamish Hills, Mount Si, and Saint Luke's Lutheran churches met to brainstorm possible ways that we could collaborate to increase the effectiveness of our ministries. There were six areas of focus:

- 1) Pastoral Duties
- 2) Administration, Finance, and Property
- 3) Outreach
- 4) Youth and Family Ministry
- 5) Music and Worship
- 6) Small Group Ministry

Multiple ideas were generated in all of these areas – it is clear that there is a tremendous opportunity to share resources and talent in very positive ways.

We also talked about the possibility of becoming "one body with multiple arms". If we could gather all of the represented churches into one larger organization, it might open up a host of new possibilities in how we worship, steward our buildings and property, engage and support our community, and generate a momentum of energy and excitement.

We recognize that this effort will take much more time and energy to sort through what might work and what isn't feasible. All agree that we need to take incremental steps rather than one giant leap. We will start by focusing on ways we can collaborate with one or more other churches where it makes sense.

The Synod is strongly in favor of this work. Pastor Herb Shao of the Synod was able to attend a bit of our meeting on April 29. He has promised to put together a request for funding to hire a part-time consultant to help us continue the exploration of this collaboration work. The Synod Council does not meet until the end of June, so it will be several weeks before we know whether this funding might be available, but Pastor Shao thinks there will be strong support for this.

It should be noted that Cross of Christ is particularly interested in connecting with Saint Andrew's as we are only about three miles apart and a greater level of synergy makes a good deal of sense here. We will be scheduling a time for the respective Executive Committees and full Councils to meet to develop relationships and better understand one another's ministry and hopes for the future.

There is much more to come, but it is exciting to think about what God may have in store for us!

The graph shows 2023 cash flow compared to history over the past 5 years.

Income in April was much lower than expected for the Easter season. Compared to average income over the past 5 years, contributions were about \$20,000 less in April.

Expenses are less than budgeted, but cash flow at the end of April is negative -\$1,863 (more money spent than received). This shortfall is paid from reserves.



Due to high contributions in January, cash flow is still trending more positive than the 5-year average.

Saint Andrew's currently supports Imagine Housing in several ways:

- Members attend (and volunteer at) Imagine Housing's fund-raising events.
- Carolynn Ferris serves as president of Imagine Housing's Board of Directors.

The latest news from Imagine Housing:

- Imagine Housing's fifteen communities are home to 1400 people with diverse backgrounds, stories, and goals.
- Imagine Housing's Board of Directors is reflective of the community they serve 63% of members are Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) and 63% identify as female. 50% of members have experienced housing instability at some point in their life and 63% currently live, or have lived, in an affordable housing community.

Some Background on Imagine Housing:

In 1987, a small group of highly passionate people at Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church saw a clear need for more affordable housing in East King County. They soon formed St. Andrew's Housing Group as an independent non-profit organization focused entirely on creating affordable apartment homes in the region.

In 1992, St. Andrew's Housing Group (SAHG) opened its first housing development, Andrew's Arms, offering 14 units of affordable housing in Issaquah, Washington.

Within 8 years, SAHG added another 176 units to the portfolio with the development and acquisition of Andrew's Heights (1995), Highland Gardens (1998), Terrace Hill (1999) Grace Place (2001, formerly Ellsworth House), and Kirkland Plaza (2001).

In 2011 St. Andrew's Housing Group was renamed Imagine Housing to more broadly reflect our mission to build and operate permanent affordable rental communities and provide support within those communities.

The Mobile Market at Hopelink

Hopelink's vision is a "Community Free of Poverty". At Saint Andrew's we support Hopelink primarily through their Food Bank. But Hopelink offers nine comprehensive programs to help end poverty in our community. Getting people who need food assistance connected with Hopelink brings them in contact with the other eight programs to help them exit poverty. From a recent Hopelink update: "Maintaining access to essential needs like nutrition is the foundation required for the success of all individuals in any Hopelink program... At a baseline level, everyone needs access to consistent, reliable nutrition to maintain employment security, housing security, and ultimately exit poverty for good."



"Some rural areas across King County have limited access to nutritious, affordable food. While Hopelink's five food bank locations offer fresh and nutritious food, some of our neighbors can't make it to a Hopelink Food Market due to barriers in transportation, work schedules, or childcare." Hopelink has a Mobile Market that is aimed at closing the gaps in access to food. It makes 11 stops in rural areas or where populations face significant barriers to accessing food.

The Mobile Market currently offers pre-packed boxes of shelf-stable items along with coolers of staples like meat and milk. Hopelink received a grant from the Washington State Department of Agriculture. "With this grant, the Mobile Market will upgrade to a bigger truck which will allow the team to offer everything available in the physical Markets on the truck, as well."

Why?" you ask. After 25 years of fairly weak farm management, Operation Bootstrap Africa (OBA) has asked the Saint Andrew's Tuesday Morning Men's (TMM) group to raise the salary for a trained manager on the almost 400-acre plot of land on which the Girls School rests. For years the farm has raised some of the food needed, but OBA thinks the farm could produce enough food to feed the girls and produce enough coffee to also provide a cash crop. For many years the farm has been managed by the Heads of School, but their focus was always on the girls, farming was a distant second. OBA approached the Saint Andrew's men's group to raise \$10,000. Half of that money is from an anonymous source, so we need to raise only \$5,000. We have gathered \$3300, but we're \$1,700 short. Please, can you help us?

The children who are receiving educational support and take away meals at Lantern Hill range in age from 4 to 22 years of age; there are 100 children with varying learning abilities who are receiving not only assistance with homework and challenging assignments, but also snacks for hungry bellies. They also receive loving support and care that keeps the kids motivated and learning; there is no dollar value for that. Regardless, there is a financial component that keeps the Lantern Hill doors open, their teachers employed, and food purchased. Additional funds are being sought to purchase a building and yard next door to the school that there can be a safe place for the kids to garden, play sports, and to sing and dance on a stage built for them; all of these simple things that we and our children get to take for granted.
