Spotters and Scooters

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Hebrews 13:2

When my siblings and I were growing up, my dad insisted that we attend church every Sunday even when we were on vacation (yes, we grumbled about it, ha-ha). Our vacations included a lot of camping trips so, if there was a service at the campground, we often attended it. Otherwise, we drove to the nearest town and attended a church there; sometimes they were Lutheran, but not always. What I remember most about those times is what it feels like to walk into an unfamiliar place and hope that you'll be welcomed in.

In a recent article in *Living Lutheran*, retired ELCA pastor Kathryn Haueisen wrote about her experience searching for a new church as a "regular" person:

While she doesn't share whether she has found a church home, she offers some good food for thought about hospitality, describing it as being about "spotters and scooters." Spotters are people who look out for those they don't know and introduce themselves. Scooters are the people who see a stranger approaching them and scoot over to invite the new person to join them.

Which one are you?

More and more people are becoming comfortable venturing out after the pandemic, and more and more people are moving into our area from other places. Many of them are looking for a new faith community. When people come through our doors for the first time, they've already at least checked out our website. More likely, though, they've also spent time watching the worship services and Discipleship Forums on our YouTube channel. By the time they're ready to come in the building, they're hoping that what they experience inperson matches up with what they've seen online.

The next time you see someone at church that you don't know, introduce yourself. Offer to sit with someone who is visiting, or invite them to sit with you. Invite them to fellowship after worship; if they accept, **go with them** so that they have someone to talk with.

If the thought of talking to someone you've never met sends you running in the other direction, grab someone who's more comfortable chatting up strangers and tag along for the conversation. Remember what it feels like to come into a new place for the first time.

Being welcoming, practicing hospitality, is about more than just greeting someone who's worshiping with us for the first time. It's also about making sure they feel comfortable and **included** and that there's a place for them here. Because there is.

Communion Distribution

We have begun a hybrid approach for receiving Holy Communion, and believe this honors all of the requests that we've gotten about receiving Communion.

- We receive at the rail on the first, third, and fifth Sundays of the month. You are invited to kneel or stand at the rail whichever is comfortable on the side in which you are seated. For safety reasons, the back sides of the rail (closest to the choir and musicians) are not available for kneeling or standing to receive Communion.
- We receive continuously on the second and fourth Sundays of the month, and also on festival Sundays and worship services, such as Easter and Christmas.

Every Sunday, we commune the east and west sides of the Sanctuary simultaneously so that you receive Communion on the side in which you are seated. The ushers guide this process.

We view this as the best way to accommodate everyone's wishes. Thank you, again, for your patience and understanding as we work to provide a meaningful worship experience for all.

- Donate colored embroidery thread to tie quilts.



Fraudulent Emails

The have learned that congregation members have received some bogus email "invitations" that "appear" to be coming from other members of Saint Andrew's. Please be aware of these - don't open any attachments and don't click on any links in the email! (1)

Phishing Red Flags

hishing is a type of social engineering where an attacker sends a fraudulent message designed to trick a human victim.

The human receiver of phishing is significantly more likely to thwart phishing attempts than technology can.

One of these Red Flags should make you very suspicious. Two or more of these **strongly** suggest a phishing message:

- If you have ever replied to another phishing attempt using this email address or mobile number
 - o Even innocent replies like "I don't understand your request."
 - o "Dark web" sites keep track of who has responded.

Urgent or threatening language

- o Pressure to respond quickly.
- o Threats of closing your account, legal action, reporting to authorities, publishing webcam video.
- o Technical Support: you have a virus, expired subscription, declined credit card.
- o Related to current event: natural disaster, war refugees, "Act Now to help."

• Requests regarding sensitive personal or financial information

- o Name, SSN, birth date, bank or computer account name or password, credit card number.
- o Updates to account information or password.
- o Any type of financial transaction: gift cards, direct deposit, crypto-currency, PayPal, Venmo, Cash App, Zelle.

Anything too good to be true

o Winning a lottery, prizes you must pay to receive, inheritance, "holding" someone else's money.

Unexpected email or text message

- o Receipt for something you didn't purchase, "Call this number to cancel."
- o Unusual notice about a package delivery (delayed or undeliverable) that prompts you to click on a link.

Information mismatch (hover mouse over address or link, but DO NOT click)

- o Incorrect sender email address: second to last part of address should be <companyname>
- o Substitution characters in address or subject line: C0MCÁ\$T versus COMCÁST (what are the 4 here?)
- o Links to non-official websites.

Suspicious attachments

- o Attachments you didn't ask for.
- o Weird file names.
- o Uncommon file types: HTML, DOC, XLS files can hurt you, among others.

Unprofessional design

- o Incorrect or blurry logos.
- o Image-only emails (no selectable text).
- o Little, poor, or no formatting.
- o Spelling or grammar errors.

• Something seems "off"

- o Unusual request.
- o Sender "tone".

Safety precautions you should take (based on *The Washington Post*)

- Don't pick up calls from unknown numbers. If it's important, they will leave a message.
- Assume people and companies are not who they say.
- Reach out to the person or company through an official channel published on their website.
- Ask a friend or family member about suspicious messages.
- Call the sender on a number you know is good.
- Slow down and trust your gut.
- Be VERY SKEPTICAL of links or phone numbers in texts, emails, or other messages.

The ABC's of Skin Cancer Prevention

Prevention of skin cancer can start at home with periodic self-examinations. Get familiar with your skin and your own pattern of moles, freckles, and beauty marks. Be alert to changes.

Always Practice Safe Sun:

- Limit sun exposure time during peak sunlight hours, 10:00 am to 3:00 pm.
- Wear protective clothing, hats, and sunglasses.
- Apply sufficient amounts of sunscreens with SPF 15 or greater.
- Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going out in the sun and reapply as necessary.

Be Aware of Skin Protection for Youth:

- Keep children, especially babies, out of the bright sun.
- Use protective clothing and hats for your children as well as special sunscreen.
- The effects of sun rays are cumulative with a large percent of our lifetime sun exposure occurring before the age of 20

Caution with Medications:

Be aware that some medications can cause photosensitivity and increasing risks with sun exposure.

- Diuretics (water pills)
- Ibuprofen
- Tetracycline
- Birth control pills
- · Some high blood pressure medications

Get an appointment with a dermatologist if you have any suspicious spots. Skin cancer is preventable and treatable. It can also spread and even cause death if untreated. As God's children, we want to take care of our skin and be healthy. "For He is our God and we are the people of his pasture, the flock under his care." Psalm 95:7.

s I write this, I am still re-living a beautiful experience that I had last weekend. Five of my A friends and I drove to the Gorge Amphitheatre and we saw Joni Mitchell in concert. For some of you, this might be interesting, for others, you might not even know who Joni Mitchell is. For me, the time was filled with joy, laughter, tears, friendship, and community ... not to mention amazing music and storytelling.

But this isn't about Joni Mitchell ... at least not entirely. For what struck me as I sat on the grass with 26,000 other people, was the church-like feeling that was there. Or perhaps I should say the "Jesusy" feeling that was there. Or maybe the Holy Spirit in action feeling. And this came from the crowd itself.



As we all sat crowded together on blankets and chairs, people told stories, shared food and drink, sang songs, helped those who were having difficulty navigating the hillside, and together we became community. The little children sitting to the right of me danced, the young girls sitting to the left of me accepted blankets from my friend, and the man in front of me told me that he had traveled from North Carolina to see Joni. He told me that he was surprised to discover the Gorge was not located in Seattle!

There was one point in the concert, after it had gotten dark, when Joni was singing and people – one by one – started shining the flashlight from their cellphones towards the stage. Throughout the crowd, little points of light lit up the darkness. Now, if you have been to a concert in the last ten years, this is a common occurrence. Cell phone lights have taken the place of lighters being raised. However, because Joni has not performed in over twenty years, she was bemused by the lights. She turned to the person next to her on stage and said, "It looks like a fallen constellation. Where did they get all those lights?"

I thought her words and her surprise were charming. But as I looked around me, at the people sharing blankets, at those with arms around each other swaying to the music, at the cozy darkness around us and the lights looking like fallen stars, it was more than charming. It was holy.

For a moment, we were a cathedral. For a moment, we were community. For a moment, we were one.

At our best, this is what it means to be church. To be the Body of Christ. To practice hospitality and generosity, and grace. To see Christ in one another. To accept others' limitations and to be accepting of our own.

I confess that all was not perfect at the Gorge. There was a person close to me who insisted on singing every word to every song. While her voice was fine, I was not there to hear her but to hear Joni. There were people who cut in line after we had been waiting two hours to get inside. There was a driver who bullied his way into the front of the very long line of vehicles as we were leaving.

Perhaps this is like church, too. At least church as a human construction. Those of us who have been part of a church for a while, we know that church is not always sharing blankets and food, singing and joy. Sometimes, as humans, we hoard our stuff. We take offense at others. We refuse to listen. We bully. We push. Our voices sometimes drown out other

And yet ... I pray that the moments of grace we receive this summer – from music at the Gorge to singing lustily in church, from sharing food on a hillside to receiving the body and blood of Christ – may we be church together. May we know and make it known that all are fully loved by God – in the times when we are like fallen constellations and in the times we are not.

May your summer be filled with holy moments.

Stewardship Corner

From a theological viewpoint, what is Stewardship? Charles Bugg defines stewardship in the Holman Bible Dictionary as "Utilizing and managing all resources God provides for the glory of God and the betterment of His creation." Another way of looking at it is: "The Christian steward is not only responsible for the financial blessings provided by God, but also the spiritual gifts that are given through the Holy Spirit."

In Genesis, God created all peoples to be stewards of His creation. Our stewardship of creation involves the caretaking of the environment and animals as well as our families and our community (whether it be our church, city, nation or world) that we live in.

Bible verses that reflect stewardship include: Genesis 1:28, Genesis 2:15, 1 Peter 4:10, 2 Corinthians 9:6-7, Luke 16:11, Proverbs 16:3.

I look at stewardship as "joyful giving". This can include the gifting of money to the church, as well as time and talents. Giving money to the church may not seem very joyful to some, however, it provides our congregation with a space for worship and fellowship. When you see the beautiful quilts on the altar provided by Dorcas Circle, you can't help but feel joyful knowing that those quilts are going to keep someone warm on a cold night.

In the next few months, we will be looking at stewardship from different angles. I am excited to see what abundant gifts our congregation will bring to Saint Andrews Lutheran Church in the coming year.

Semi-Annual Meeting Highlights

The Semi-Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held on June 4, 2023. At this meeting, the following topics were presented and discussed:

- Finances: Congregation Treasurer Bill Brueggemann provided an update on the finances of the church.
 - o Income is 3% under budget (unfavorable trend). Expenses are 5% under budget (favorable trend).
 - o Cash flow is negative, but better than our most recent 5-year average. Our reserves are adequate. The Cash Flow chart is available each month in the VOICE.
- Sanctuary Refresh: Worship and Liturgical Arts (WLA) Committee Chair Sharon Gurtel provided an update.
 - o The project began in 2018, but was paused due to COVID. WLA received designated funds for this project (approximately \$7800.) The overview was approved by 2018-2019 Congregation Council.
 - o The vision is for a more contemporary look and feel, extending outdoor elements we see through Sanctuary windows, lighten overall color palette. After meeting with many local artists, Warren Weber from Bothell was selected.
 - o Initial pieces to update:
 - Lectern: will be a more appropriate size for space, have lighter colors, and an Alpha/Omega design.
 - Baptismal Font: will feature curved wood (like flowing water) and have lighter colors.
 - Christ Candle: will be similar in design to Baptismal font.
 - o WLA will provide updates as received by the artist.
- Stewardship: New Stewardship Chair Kit Bowerman spoke about the importance of Stewardship and shared a text from Paul's letter to Corinthians. Plans are being made for Fall and Kit is looking for volunteers to work with him.
- **Affordable Housing:** Hal Ferris provided information about upcoming Affordable Housing opportunities.
 - o The Bellevue City Council is about to approve code changes that would allow churches to build affordable housing on excess land. Saint Andrew's could use part of the parking lot and unused land east of that (about 2 of our 4.5 acres) for affordable housing.
 - o At this time, initial conversations are taking place to explore this possibility. No money is being spent and no decisions have been made. If we move forward, this would be a multi-year process.
- Cluster Collaboration: Congregation Council President Carolynn Ferris provided an update on collaboration occurring within our cluster (our cluster includes ELCA congregations in our area, and Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ, St. Luke's, Holy Cross, Mt. Si, and Sammamish Hills have been active in these conversations.)
 - o Conversations have recognized challenges, but focused on abundance. We have many assets. What can we do with them? On April 29, there was a cluster collaboration brainstorming session that identified Pastoral duties, Worship/Music, Buildings/Property, Youth/Family ministries, Outreach, and Small Groups as potential areas for collaboration. Many ideas were shared and conversations will continue.
 - o Pastor Herb Shao from the synod has requested funding for a consultant to help this effort.

Bellevue Korean Methodist Church (BKMC)

The Bellevue Korean Methodist Church is a relatively small congregation (10 - 12 worshipers) that has been utilizing space at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Factoria. Holy Cross is a part of our NW ELCA Cluster.

Holy Cross has recently sold their property to Habitat for Humanity. The plan is to redevelop their building and land over the next 2-3 years in order to provide homeownership opportunities for lower income families, as well as build a community space that could accommodate worship and other potential community uses. Because of this redevelopment, all users of the building are being asked to find new venues for the time being.

The BKMC has approached us to see if they can relocate their worship and fellowship activities to our facility for the foreseeable future. They are interested in utilizing Fellowship Hall South to hold worship services at 6:00 am on Saturdays and 11:00 am on Sunday. They may also want to utilize our kitchen facilities on occasion.

The Council recently voted to adopt a statement declaring that we hope to attract outside organizations that are in alignment with our mission to "Grow in Christ to Love and Serve all People". The Executive Committee will review the terms of their engagement and, if they are consistent with the direction of Council and for the betterment of Saint Andrew's, will engage with BKMC to potentially execute a rental agreement.

As a note, this rental agreement will have clauses that require the BKMC to recognize and honor that we are an Reconciling in Christ congregation and that if and when there is a conflict of schedules for the Fellowship Hall South space, they will be relocated to another area of our building.

CFH Hosting – September

Congregations for the Homeless (CFH) has requested that we host the Rotating Shelter in September this year. As you know, we have been inviting the men to stay with us during the evenings in the month of March for some time. It was planned that we change to host for the month of June, but CFH learned that the church that typically serves them in September cannot do so for this year. Therefore, they have asked us to open our doors for them this year from September 1 - 29. Kurt Lutterman has given his endorsement and is prepared for the effort. Council voted to approve this invitation. In 2024, we expect to have CFH stay with us in the month of June.

Staff Reviews / Goal Setting

We recently chose to move staff reviews and goal setting to the summer months in recognition of the fact that our program year roughly aligns with the school year – beginning in September and ending in June. Review and goal-setting meetings are taking place the last two weeks of June.

Saint Andrew's Pictorial Directory

It has been seven years since we last published a pictorial congregation directory. This has been on a "to do" list for some time, but it has been difficult to pull together the time and resources to make it happen – not to mention the disruption caused by COVID.

We are planning to schedule a time in September to take pictures and gather updated member information. Susan Hegedus will be leading this effort but is anxious to find a few helpers to make it happen. If you have any interest in being a part of this important effort, please contact Susan, susan@salc.church.

Affordable Housing Opportunity

As discussed in our recent Semi-Annual meeting, there may be a chance to develop an affordable housing project on our excess property. Due to pending Land Use Code changes in Bellevue, property owned by religious institutions that are close to transit may be up-zoned to greater density if permanently affordable housing is developed. Imagine Housing is in the process of exploring what might be possible on our property.

This will take time, and any potential project must be approved by the congregation. We will update you as things progress!

Income was higher in May than in April but is about \$11,000 below budget for the year.

Expenses are \$18,000 below budget for the year.

Cash Flow is negative \$11,367 (more money spent than received.) As the graph shows, cash flow is historically negative until the end of the year. Fortunately, we have cash reserves in the bank to pay bills, staff salaries, and donations to mission partners.

Cash flow is trending better in 2023 than the 5-year average.

Congregations for the Homeless (CFH): The Council approved hosting CFH for the month of September 2023. **Pastor Lara Forbes' Report:**

- Pastor is a member of the Synod Team for Authentic Diversity (STAD). STAD is planning an anti-racism training/ education event for October for rostered and lay people in our synod, which is mandatory for clergy every three years.
- The STAD team met with the Episcopal Circles team (their anti-racism/intercultural team) for the Diocese of Olympia to exchange ideas and information.
- Pastor encouraged Council members to read or listen to an article that touches on the struggles of churches in our area and what their future mission and vision might be. 
Ministry of the Month for July and August ~ Congregations for Kids

Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church has been supporting Congregations for Kids since they began their work in 1996. That first year they filled and distributed backpacks to 143 children in 12 schools.

New backpacks are given to Kindergarteners, 2nd, 4th, 6th, 9th and 11th graders, and other students if needed.

Friends of Lantern Hill

Lantern Hill, Linterna del Camino, has one mission – to break the cycle of poverty in Mexico. The group has ELCA roots.

It works to supply struggling families with food resources and to help keep children in school.

An inter-generation group from Saint Andrew's (the "Mexico 12") went on a mission trip to Lantern Hill in 2019.

For Shana Nielsen, it was an eye-opening, life changing and amazing experience. She has since become a Board Member of Friends of Lantern Hill and is a member of our Outreach and Servant Ministries Committee.

"My trips to Lantern Hill have been inspirational and incredibly humbling. These children have so little, yet find joy in the simplest things: getting a new pair of socks for Christmas, playing soccer with their friends on a playcourt the size of our living rooms, or reading a new book that was donated to their school."

The needs are so tremendous and yet it takes so little to support the 100 students that are currently enrolled.

Our church has been supporting Lantern Hill since the return of our Mexico 12. "It doesn't take much," Shana said. "Even a small check will make a difference to the families in this poverty stricken area outside of Ensenada."

To support Lantern Hill, write a check to Saint Andrew's with "Lantern Hill" in the memo line. Here are some examples of how donations will help:

- \$10 10 meals for students. This includes costs of food and staff to prepare.
- \$15 I bus pass for I week to allow a student to get to High School or University.
- \$25 I teacher's salary for I day.
- \$50 Water costs per week. This includes water for facilities as well as bottled water for drinking.
- \$100 3 weeks of electricity and internet for the program.
- \$150 High School Tuition.
- \$250 1 month's rent on the 2 properties we have to rent for the program.
- \$500 University tuition for 1 student for 1 year.



KidVantage

The Issaquah-based KidVantage, formerly known as Eastside Baby Corner, helps children reach their full potential tomorrow by providing their basic needs today.

KidVantage began by supplying under-served families with new babies with items such as diapers, formula, and baby clothes. As the Eastside has grown, so has the need.

Saint Andrew's member Liz Rudolph volunteers at KidVantage. "All children, from infants to teenagers, need our help with clothing, shoes, jackets, and toys," she said. "For many of these children a toy from KidVantage and a jacket may be the only toy they've ever had and the first jacket they've owned."

Currently the group is low on clothing and toys – a tough situation for summer when kids are home with nothing to do.

"We use new toys to fill birthday bag requests and we're trying to stock up for the holidays now," she said.

A recent influx of refugees from Somalia, Afghanistan, and Venezuela need children's clothing of all sizes.

"The need," Liz said, "is great."

The clothing and toys can be new or gently used.

Lantern Hill, Mexico

hristmas in July...First thought conjures up a picture of Santa Claus with his red hat and shorts, and a brightly colored shirt with palm trees on it...sounds fun, festive, and something I could really get on board to celebrate! Before our intergenerational mission trip to Ensenada, Mexico in the summer of 2019, thoughts of Mexico also stirred up visions of fun, merriment, blue skies, and warm water. Since our trip however, Mexico has new meaning for me, as I now picture the beautiful yellow school, appropriately named Lantern Hill, which serves as an after school and summer education program for a community of 100 children who a few years ago were not expected to complete more than the 6th grade. Without Lantern Hill, many of these children would not know if or when they would have their next meal, and they didn't have university trained teachers spending individualized time helping them with their homework. These kids have a safe place to go after school where they are tutored, have a safe place to play, they are fed, challenged to do their best, and are inspired and expected to set goals for themselves that takes them way beyond primary school.

For the month of July, I am so grateful for our Outreach and Servant Ministries Committee who is supporting Lantern Hill and KidVantage: two fabulous organizations that want more for children who are in challenging situations and where a donation will make a significant difference for a child. Please see the previous page for examples of what a financial donation to Lantern Hill of as little as \$10 will support.

MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania

PRAY for these Maasai young women on their educational journey!!

On May 6, 2023, 16 young Maasai women walked in the Form 6 graduation ceremony. These young women are now anxiously awaiting their exam results so they may start applying to universities. The timeline is very tight, as they usually do not receive their exam results until mere weeks before the universities open. We believe our graduates will do exceptionally well!

Many of the Form 4 graduates left campus shortly after completing their exams in October of 2022. Of the 67 students who took their "A" Level (Advanced) entrance exams, 65 are moving forward to Form 5! We won't know how many will return from the nationally scheduled eightmonth break from school. This is a crucial time in their lives as they need to avoid unwanted pregnancies and early arranged marriages. We hope and pray they all return safely and ready in late July to start the next level of their education.

Saint Andrew's supports MGLSS in a variety of ways. Many Saint Andrew's members individually support girls in the MGLSS scholarship program with either full or half scholarships. These scholarships are important for the girls to continue their education.

The biggest expansion news? The land purchased in Arusha for their permanent housing (that will include operating theatres) is now ready for infrastructure development, meaning water, sewer, and electricity!! Permits have been granted – we are thankful to God and Tanzanian leadership.

And the biggest fund-raising news? Sarah Rejman, the founder and director of The Plaster House, will be coming to Seattle area October 31 to November 3!! More details will be coming as plans are finalized. Please check their website and sign up for their newsletter to stay informed. PRAY and mark your calendar!
