### Keeping Faith and Sharing Good News

"So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples." Matthew 28:8

A few weeks ago, on the day I announced Dick Swaisgood's unexpected death, someone Aasked me, "When will this dark cloud over our congregation go away?" I've been thinking about the above verse from Matthew's account of Jesus' resurrection ever since.

The women who went to the tomb early on that first Easter morning weren't expecting anything out of the ordinary. They were going to prepare the body of their friend who had died three days earlier, and whose body was wrapped in a cloth and sealed tightly in a tomb.

But then there was an earthquake, and an angel came and rolled back the stone and sat on top of it and said to them, "Do not be afraid." Any of those things would have been enough to terrify me.

But the story doesn't end there. After the angel announced that Jesus had been raised, as he said he would be, he invited the women into the tomb to see for themselves, and told them to go quickly to tell the others what has happened.

And they did. They went with fear, **and also** with great joy. And when they met Jesus along the way, he spoke those same words, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell." And they did.

There are people who say that having faith in Jesus means that our lives will be filled with sunshine and roses all the time and that nothing bad will ever happen to us and we'll never fear anything in this world ever again. But we know it doesn't work that way.

When Jesus told the women to not be afraid, he knew that they already were and that they would continue to be, even as they went out to tell others that he had risen. In that moment, not even the resurrection could take their fear away. What it did instead was enable the women to keep their faith amid their fears and share their good news in spite of their anxiety.

Our lives are marked by extremes like fear and joy, and we experience them both at the same time. Like the fear of figuring out how to live when someone you love dies unexpectedly, and the joy in the gift that that person was to you.

But in Christ's resurrection, we have God's promise that life is stronger than death, that love is greater than hate, and that the pain and suffering of this life are temporary. Which isn't to say that pain and suffering aren't real and sometimes tangible, but they don't have the final word.

Do not be afraid. Go and tell. In a world where our lives are framed by fear and joy, despair and hope, and doubt and trust, living these commandments makes a difference now more than ever. Because when we do, it brings God's promise of life for ourselves as well as for others. And instead of fear and pain – or any dark cloud – taking over our lives, the risen Christ moves us through it and moves through it with us. Thanks be to God!

### Family Game Night



On the topic of praising God, worship at WSYG was also a wonderful

experience. Our theologians Jaz Waring and Reverend Libby Denton did a phenomenal job not only preaching the scriptures and helping us understand the meaning of them, but also tying them into our modern world. For example, when the two amazing theologians were talking about when the Galileans started speaking different languages with their heads on fire, they had us imagine what it would feel like to have the Holy Spirit move through and into you to preach God's word. Reading the bible is important for understanding Christianity, however, by relating these messages and scriptures to the lives of the teenagers there, worship was more relatable. This caused me to greatly enjoy learning about God, as well as helping me create a deeper connection with God.

In addition to that, the leaders there encouraged everybody, no matter who they were or what they looked like, to come sit in front of the stage praising God in unison. That had an incredibly deep impact on me, because they were creating an incredibly welcoming environment where everybody could be themselves, no matter what that meant to them. I could do my goofy dance moves, feeling comfortable and supported, even though I am not a dancer by any stretch of the imagination.

There was also a giant screen that displayed the stage, which was quite helpful for people like me sitting in the back. The lyrics were displayed on the screen, kind of like at our church, but I wish that they would have included the music, as I had never sung any of the songs before.

Everything about the worship and music was incredible, but I sincerely hope that next year, in New Orleans, the music will be less loud, especially for the people who are sitting right next to the speakers.

Now, I would be honored to talk about the speakers at WSYG. These were Reverend Nicolette Penaranda, Bishop Brenda Bos, Rebekah Bruesehoff, and others. Every day at mainstage (WSYG's name for worship), I would look forward to hearing these incredible powerful, inspirational, and motivating people speak from their hearts about the issues which unfortunately still exist in today's world. As a person who is extremely privileged and lucky in today's world, many of these issues had quite rarely, if ever, entered my mind.

After I heard each of these speakers preach, I was incredibly speechless. The only word that came to my mind during the first few minutes following their speeches was "WOW". I truly believe that for the world to become a place where everybody feels safe and welcome, more people like these speakers must preach to youth like us, as youth can be the difference between people never once hearing these messages and sharing them with everybody they know. 
# Women's Early Book Study (WEBS)

#### Homer Berner Scholarship: Seeley Lester

Seeley Lester has completed her first year at Gonzaga. She asked to have the Homer Berner Scholarship renewed for this next academic year. Council enthusiastically voted to award her \$500 for this coming academic year in our August meeting.

#### ELCA Cluster Collaboration - Synod Funding

You may recall from comments in the Semi-Annual meeting that Pastor Herb Shao of the Synod had agreed to submit a proposal to the Synod to fund a consultant to help spearhead efforts around our collaboration efforts with the churches in our cluster. I recently learned that Pastor Shao has gone on medical leave and did not submit any proposal. I currently have a meeting scheduled for August 24 to meet with Dianne Johnson of the Synod. She has agreed to help us put together the request to Synod.

#### Affordable Housing Opportunity

Imagine Housing is working on a potential proposal to develop an affordable housing community on our property. A Land Use Code Amendment (LUCA) was approved by the Bellevue City Council which will allow us to have our property upzoned to develop multifamily affordable housing. The initial thinking is to focus on low-income family housing with up to 100 - 120 units. We will likely be pushing to build the apartment up to five stories tall in order to decrease the footprint of the building and save as many trees as possible. (The current height limit would allow a three- or four-story building). A major focus will also be to ensure there will be adequate parking for the church as well as the residents.

Imagine Housing has engaged an architect to create a preliminary plan which can be shared with the congregation, the City of Bellevue, and potential funders to give everyone an idea of what might be possible. A virtual meeting was scheduled for August 17 with representatives from Imagine, Saint Andrew's, and the architect to review preliminary drawings. If any of you are interested in participating in this and/or future meetings, please let me know.

A potential timeline might include a preliminary proposal from Imagine Housing in the fall of 2023, a Congregational vote in January 2024, final design in late 2024, building construction in 2025. Much more is yet to come!

#### Comments

Income in June and July was much better than in 2022. Thank you for your support!

**Expenses** are \$17,700 below budget for the year.

**Cash Flow** for the year is negative \$21,367 (more money spent than received.) As the graph shows, cash flow is historically negative until the end of the year. Fortunately, we have cash reserves in the bank to pay bills, staff salaries and donations to mission partners. Cash flow is trending better in 2023 than the 5-year average and much better than in 2022.

#### **Giving Options – Special Note**

Saint Andrew's has fully migrated to new membership software (**Breeze**). **Breeze** automatically records electronic contributions (credit cards and direct bank deposits) from **Tithe.ly** into the membership database. We will be contacting members who still make contributions using **Simply Giving/VANCO** in the near future to assist you in moving to **Tithe.ly**. This will be less work for the finance staff and will help ensure membership giving records are accurate. You may switch at any time by clicking the "Give/Donate" menu option on the Saint Andrew's website (<u>salc.church/giving-options</u>) and registering your contribution with Tithe.ly. There is also a button to remove your contribution from VANCO. Forgot your VANCO password? No problem, just email bill@salc.church and I'll do the VANCO deletion for you.

It centers on Quanah, the greatest Comanche chief. The book spans two astonishing stories. The first traces the rise and fall of the Comanches, the most powerful Indian tribe in American history. The second entails one of the most remarkable narratives ever to come out of the Old West: the epic saga of the pioneer woman Cynthia Ann Parker and her mixed-blood son Quanah, who became the last and greatest chief of the Comanches.

# Did You Know..... the original language of the Puget Sound region was Lushootseed.

The land acknowledgment that Saint Andrew's uses to respect and honor the Indigenous Peoples of the land where our church is located identifies them as the Duwamish and Coast Salish people.

"We, at Saint Andrew's Lutheran Church, acknowledge that in this space we are on the traditional lands of the Duwamish and Coast Salish people. A people that are still here, continuing to honor and bring to light their ancestral heritage."

These people and those throughout the Puget Sound region spoke a dialect of the Lushootseed language. These people and their language are being recognized in a number of ways and places around the region. Four of the Port of Seattle's parks have been renamed using the Lushootseed language. At Renton's Gene Coulon Park, displays on Bird Island include wildlife names in the Lushootseed language including pronunciation information. The Lushootseed language uses its own alphabet which makes it difficult to even try to pronounce the words.

The former Terminal 105 Park is now **tu?əlaltx** Village Park & Shoreline Habitat. ("t-oo-ah-lal-too-wx"; Herring's House).

The former Terminal 107 Park is now **hə?apus Village Park & Shoreline Habitat.** ("ha-ah-poos").

The next time you visit Coulon Park, take the boardwalk to Bird Island at the southwest corner of the park. From here spot the wildlife and note the information signs that include names in the Lushootseed language. See the example.

# Northwest Washington Synod

## From Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee

I went to the musical 1776 a few nights ago where I learned some new things about how the Declaration of Independence came to be written. As I watched, I felt proud to be an American – to be part of a group of people who wanted freedom from tyranny, freedom to vote, freedom from an empire far away.

There were also moments in this play when I was horrified at some decisions made. At the last minute, the clause to abolish slavery was removed so that all of the representatives would sign the document. The most powerful song in the musical, *Molasses to Rum*, reminds the audience how all the colonies were complicit in the selling of humans – not just the south.

As an American, I hold two realities. First, I rejoice in the wonder and aspiration of the United States of America. I am grateful for this country and I love what it is striving to be. At its best, it is a country where freedom and liberty are supreme. It is a place where care is given to those arriving on its shores. It is a place where people can freely go to church and other places of worship (or not go at all). In short, the United States is a promise of what can be.

At the same time, I hold the truth of this country's sins. Enslaved men built the White House, the U.S. Capitol building, and others. Homes of former presidents including George Washington's Mount Vernon and James Madison's Montpelier were built by men "owned" by them. The land that we in the Northwest Washington Synod are living on was once land that belonged to Samish and Duwamish, Lummi, and Muckleshoot and many others. Japanese people were unjustly imprisoned during World War II. Sundown laws and redlining laws were written throughout this country. As a white woman, I know that I could not vote until 1919. For women of color, the right to vote did not come until later. People who are part of the LGBTQIA+ communities have been harassed and discriminated against, beaten up and killed in this country. And discriminatory practices and violence continue to this day. In short, the systems in this country have violated and harmed people since its inception.

This is what it means to be an American: to vote, to engage in civic society, to appreciate this country, to grieve past and present sins, and to truthfully stand up and speak when it falls short of its ideals.

But what about those of us who are American and also Christian? Unequivocally it means that as much as one might love this country, this is not where our ultimate allegiance lies. For we are part of the body of Christ that extends beyond the borders of any country. As Lutheran Christians, we know that we are named, chosen, and called by God through Jesus. We hold deeply the joy that we are freed from sin, and, because of this, we are called into radical love, acceptance, and welcome – far beyond being a citizen of any country. We are freed to live beyond racism, injustice, and bigotry. Martin Luther wrote that freedom is a gift from God, not just for our sake, or our country's sake, but for the sake of the world.

Tragically, there are those who want to distort this freedom. To somehow merge Christian and American identities. Rather than freedom, conflating religious authority with political authority leads to tyranny and marginalization - especially of minority groups. Christian Nationalism is neither patriotic nor is it faithful. You do not have to be Christian to be a "true" American. And you do not have to be American to be Christian. At its heart, it is idolatrous. As the First Commandment states, "You shall have no other gods."

Together, as faithful Christians, let us live into Jesus' words –into radical love, acceptance and welcome. Let us speak truth to power and stand with those without power. Let us follow Jesus who commands us to love everyone as our brothers and sisters and siblings including our fellow citizens, those of other belief systems, and those of other nations. Together, as faithful Christians, let us stand up and speak out against Christian Nationalism and any system that marginalizes, harms, and subjugates another. As Jesus announces in the gospel of Luke, '*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.*'

For freedom Christ has set us free. May we live and dance and revel in the freedom of Christ.

**JUNE** brought a master's level student in Public Health to standardize the medical operations manual as The Plaster House expands to other locations. Their board signed an MoU (Memo of Understanding) with the Foundation for African Medicine and Education (FAME) to bring their high-love, low-cost care to Karatu, a growing center for tourism and commerce. Recently they treated their first group of patients who are now recovering in their new rented facility.

**JULY** brought parents and teens from the USA for the annual TPH Immersion trip, volunteering at the three care-residences. If your family is interested in a future trip, contact Jean Wahlstrom. They go every July, led by their USA board chair, Gail Gettler (includes safari).

**AUGUST** welcomes medical personnel from One World Medical Relief for a plastic surgery clinic. They will be focusing on children with cleft lips and palates and burn scar contractures.

#### **ONGOING:**

The program to build their own surgical and residential outpatient center on the west edge of Arusha is going very well. They have a project development manager who reports that the water is connected, their security fence is going up, and the 750 trees they have planted are taking root on the non-goat side of the fence.

Sarah and staff send their heartfelt gratitude for our prayers and support. The children thank you with their smiles, some smiling for the first time in their lives, each deeply grateful for the treatments that give them hope!!

#### COMING THIS FALL

Please be watching for the news of the rebranding of the name "THE PLASTER HOUSE." Because of their taking on a non-profit status in Tanzania – it is a change in their legal structure which enables their expansion - they will be changing the name BUT NOT the ministry and service to the children. CFH clients, staff, and volunteers are enjoying settling in to the new shelter on Eastgate Way.

The Rotating Shelter will continue to be a separate group of men who stay at different churches each month and are committed to sobriety and finding housing. Many of the men in the program are employed.

Saint Andrews is looking forward to hosting the Rotating Shelter during September and we already have members signed up to do grocery shopping, make cards, provide dinners, serve as hosts, and bring in hot breakfasts for the special days that the men will be staying all day (September 2, 4, and 23). All other days, the men will arrive at 6:00 pm and leave by 7:30 am. On Sundays they will be invited to stay for the Adult Discipleship Hour Forum and Church. Because we are hosting the men for the second time in 2023, the other churches are helping to provide dinners, non-perishable food and other supplies. There are 18 men in the program right now. In 2024 we will be hosting the men in June instead of March.

From CFH: This name change comes after considerable thought, research, and many conversations with important stakeholders. Since October 1993, when CFH welcomed its first guest, the name "Congregations for the Homeless" has served us well. But perceptions and attitudes about homelessness and social services have evolved in the past three decades, and so has CFH. With the opening of our new shelter in its permanent location, the timing is right to refresh our brand and showcase our evolved continuum of care.

The name PorchLight embodies the guiding principles and values underpinning our work from the beginning: Relationships, Dignity and Respect, Community, and Empowerment. Just as a porch light provides a beacon of hope and warmth, this organization provides a guiding light for those in need, offering a safe space, support, and a sense of belonging to individuals experiencing homelessness. And while our name is changing, our core values, mission, and dedication to serving our community remain steadfast.

Before the end of September, you will see updated communication materials and new social media channels. We will also be launching a new website: porchlightcares.org – a forward will be in place to ensure everyone who visits our website lands in the right place.

### MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania



Welcome to a very busy time at MGLSS!! **Recruitment** for the new Form One class is underway. The teacher task force is out in the bush and should finish by the end of August. PRAY for wisdom in the selection process and safety as they travel into the interior.

All Form 6 graduates last spring have reported for their compulsory military training, they will be returning to their homes at end of September to wait for their exam results and, hopefully, their university or vocational training placements. One of our students who Saint Andrew's sponsored with a Post-MGLSS scholarship, **Mary Sepere**, will graduate in October in Pharmaceutical Science and will wait for placement. The other student, **Witness Kivyuo**, has one more year of university.

The most urgent need for prayer is for more of the Form 4 **students to return** to MGLSS from their long 10-month break. Of the 67 students who passed their Form 4 exams in October 2022, only 28 have returned to school at this time, 10 have transferred to government schools, 6 are confirmed pregnant. Form 5 classes started in July.

Saint Andrew's has also been instrumental in the hiring of **Avitus Rukonge**, a qualified farm manager at MGLSS. This year the farm produced 1,505 kilos of coffee (3,300 pounds) that were sold for 8,578,500 Tanzanian shillings (at 2,485 shillings per dollar, that's \$3,564.52), both figures are double the totals from last year. He has sold/traded five old cows for two young milkers that give much more milk than the old ones, leaving them with a total of 7 cows. And, despite a drought in the long rainy season, he has planted 500 new coffee bushes from the nursery he's started. New bushes will produce coffee in 3 years. More stories will be forthcoming, but these are great numbers.

The Maasae Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS) Farm Manager program has reached its goal for 2023! As noted before, Jason Bergmann of Operation Bootstrap Africa had reached out to the Saint Andrew's Tuesday Morning Men (TMM) group earlier this year and asked if they were willing to fund a new full-time farm manager for the almost 400-acre plot of land on which the Girls School rests. The proposal called for funding \$10,000 a year for three years. TMM accepted the challenge. An anonymous donor offered a \$5000 in matching funds for the first year. The congregation stepped up and the goal was reached in June. Actually the goal has been exceeded by over \$2400. The excess will be used as part of next years contribution.
