When I was in grad school, I traveled to Nicaragua for a mission trip with the campus ministry group over spring break. We stayed in a village in a remote area near the border with Honduras, and worked alongside the residents helping level (by hand!) the site for a community center that would be built by another group a couple of weeks later.

On our first day there, we and the village residents all gathered for worship in an outdoor open space. Our pastor, who didn't speak any Spanish, co-led a bilingual service with the local pastor. We stood the entire time because there weren't enough seats for everyone. We learned the songs by call and response. We prayed the Lord's Prayer in the language we were comfortable with; it was a beautiful cacophony of voices. But when it came time to receive Communion, our group was surprised because the elements were Wonder Bread and Pepsi. (We later learned that it was because that's what was available.) We received that bread and soda as reverently as we would have if they'd been Luther bread and wine or grape juice.

When I share the Communion part of this story, the responses to it are varied. Some people think it's great, and others are offended by it. When I look back on the experience, though, I remember the sacredness of that moment – the way that it connected us to Jesus and to one another not just that day, but even now.

As Christians, we experience that sacredness, that connectedness, every time we receive Communion. When we gather and hear the words "given and shed for you," and take in the very real presence of Christ "in, with, and under" the elements, we trust and remember. We trust Christ's promise of forgiveness, and we remember his commandment to "do this in remembrance of me."

This trust and remembrance, these acts of faith, make tangible the promise of God's grace in Jesus. The promise that is freely given to us in our outstretched hands. The promise we carry with us and share with others when we go out into the world. May it assure you of your connectedness to Jesus today and always.



Communion Practices at Saint Andrew's

On the night that Jesus was betrayed, he took bread, blessed and broke it and shared it with his friends, saying "Take and eat, this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After they had eaten, Jesus took the cup, blessed it and shared it with his friends, saying "This cup is the new covenant in my blood which is shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Over the last few months, we have been receiving communion at the altar in a hybrid manner: alternating the practice of processing with receiving at the rail. Processional communion has us continuously walking, while receiving at the rail allows us to kneel or stand. We will continue alternating these two practices, as it best honors the wishes of all members of our congregation.

With both of these practices, the Worship and Liturgical Arts Committee (WLA) also began the practice of both sides of the Sanctuary simultaneously being served. This is primarily for safety reasons. Walking on the back side of the altar space is a safety issue because of the multiple microphones, cords, and instruments that are in the very small space between the piano/choir and the altar. To minimize the potential for accidents, the ushers direct us to avoid walking in that space when going to and coming from the altar for communion. This is accomplished by communing from the altar rail side that corresponds to the side of the sanctuary where you are seated.

On the Sundays that we receive at the rail, anyone seated on the west (organ) side of the Sanctuary is asked to fill in from the end of the padding nearest to the organ and continue to the baptismal font. Anyone seated on the east (pulpit) side is asked to fill in from the baptismal font and continue to the end of the padding nearest the pulpit. As we do this, we "complete the circle." The pastor and communion server team continuously walk in a counter-clockwise circle inside the altar rail, starting on the organ side.

On processional communion Sundays, both sides of the Sanctuary are served starting near the baptismal font. Each person moves from receiving bread to receiving wine/juice and then depositing their empty cup in the provided basket. The ushers direct us to exit from one side of each pew and return via the other side to avoid congestion in the aisles.

At Saint Andrew's we are so fortunate to be gathered around the table throughout the entire service because of the architecture of our worship space. With the sacrament always in view, it allows us to focus to "do this in remembrance of [Jesus]" with reverence and thanksgiving, no matter the position of our body.

This Sanctuary refresh project was begun prepandemic and designated (donor directed) funds were received in 2019. The overall scope of the project, which will be done in stages, is to update the look and feel of the Sanctuary with more of a nod toward an





KnitWits and Gratitude

The Saint Andrew's KnitWits (Knitting as Witnesses) are a fellowship who exemplify the church's mission of growing together in Christ to love and serve all people. The group meets once a month to share what they are knitting or crocheting and to learn from each other. The KnitWits began as a prayer shawl ministry that provided prayer shawls as a tangible gift of prayer for those needing comfort. Over time the prayer shawls were given as signs of welcome or departure. The KnitWits expanded the types of items that they made to include baptismal blankets, hats, wash cloths, scarves, and many other items making up the 600-plus items that are distributed each year. Items have been sent to 30 different organizations as shown in the illustration. During the pandemic many organizations were unable to accept items because workers and volunteers were quarantined. The KnitWits continued to make items, and once organizations could accept items, the KnitWits sent out just under 600 items per year during the pandemic.


There are several perspectives to gratitude with respect to the KnitWits and their activities. The first of these are the direct expressions from the recipients. It can be from:

- A soldier who is away from family and home ("The scarf that was knitted for me brought on some cheerfulness."; "Thank you for taking time out of your day, to think about the service members deployed and investing your time and money in making this scarf for us. I am grateful for the men and women that support us like you do.");
- Someone who has lost a loved one ("It is always comforting to know that someone cares about the loss of a loved one.");
- People undergoing medical procedures ("The prayer shawl keeps me warm during chemo and reminds me that you are praying for me.").

Expressions of gratitude can also come from the various organizations that work tirelessly to support:

- Underserved communities ("Because of you, families in our community have hope.");
- Victims of domestic abuse ("We appreciate your kindness and generosity."; "Your gifts make a difference.");
- Students ("A reminder that someone was thinking of me")
- Education ("Babies in Washington will have purple hats ... reminding caretakers to never shake a baby.").

The other sense of gratitude is one that the KnitWits have personally - through the work of their hands, they feel the gratitude in their hearts. While the many thank-you notes are fully appreciated, gratitude also comes from the fellowship of the knitting/crocheting ministry. The KnitWits are grateful for the opportunity to meet, learn, and share with each other and know that they have a common ministry of using their skills to help all. They knit or crochet gratitude into every stitch. The KnitWits are also grateful for the support shown by the members of Saint Andrew's for this ministry. As it says in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

ELCA Cluster Collaboration

There has been renewed energy in our efforts to connect more meaningfully with congregations in our Cluster. A few updates:

- 1) The Synod is very interested in supporting our work within the Cluster. They have agreed to partially fund one or two project coordinators / coaches to help move us forward. We will be working to develop a scope of work for these individuals and outline potential next steps.
- 2) Pastor Mark Griffith has returned to Saint Luke's in north Bellevue. He is very energized about our efforts and will become very engaged with the collaboration efforts.
- 3) We are planning a joint meeting with the Executive Committees from Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ, and Saint Luke's. We hope to have bold discussions about how we might "do church" differently in the future.
- 4) We still hope to have a refresh of our cluster workshop that took place in April 2023. This likely won't happen until after the first of the year given the holiday schedule.

Affordable Housing Project Task Force

An effort is underway now to identify individuals to serve on a Task Force that can take the lead in exploring options, gathering input from the congregation, developing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Imagine Housing, and possibly bring forth a proposal to the congregation in our 2024 Annual Meeting. I have reached out to Art Gurtel and those who were elected to serve on the this year's Nominating Committee to get them started on their work to identify candidates for our 2024 Council.



Comments

- **Income** was the lowest month this year and well below expectations, \$20,000 less than last year. To meet the 2023 budget, \$267,000 is needed in October - December. Last year \$255,000 was received in those months and we encourage members to again step up their contributions to meet Saint Andrew's needs.
- **Expenses** continue \$21,400 below budget for the year. Staff and committees are doing a good job managing expenses.
- Cash Flow for the year is now more negative than the 5-year average and only slightly better than in 2022. Please consider making additional contributions this year to make up for this deficit.

Reminder – Please Use Tithe.ly for Your Electronic Contributions

Saint Andrew's uses two software applications, **Breeze** and **Tithe.ly** for membership and contribution records. Your giving statements are sent to you from **Breeze**. Electronic contributions (credit cards and direct bank deposits) using **Tithe.ly** are automatically recorded into **Breeze**. The old way, using **VANCO** (also known as Simply Giving) requires the finance staff to manually record the transactions, which is extra work plus errors can be made.

Members who are still using VANCO are encouraged to switch to Tithe.ly. This will ensure that your contribution statements are accurate at year end. You may switch at any time by clicking the GIVE/DONATE button on the Saint Andrew's website and registering your contribution with **Tithe.ly**. There is also a button to remove your contribution from VANCO. Forgot your VANCO password? No problem, just email financial secretary Jan Bowerman or myself, bill@salc.church and we will do the VANCO deletion for you.

Giving Options

You may contribute in many ways:

- Donate from your bank account or credit card by going to salc.church/giving-options and selecting the "Tithe.ly Online Giving" button. NOTE: a processing fee is charged for electronic transactions.
- Ask your bank to automatically send a check periodically to Saint Andrew's.
- Mail or drop off cash or checks to the church.
- On Sundays, you can drop cash or checks into the offering plate.
- Transfer shares of stock or required IRA distributions. Please contact Bill Brueggemann for the necessary forms.

In the song *Amazing Grace* we sing, "I once was lost but now I'm found."

Because my job sometimes involves travel, there are times when I am wandering unfamiliar airports – trying to find my flight, trying to find edible food, trying to find a place to charge my phone, trying to find a place where there isn't a cacophony of sound and crowds of people. And sometimes at airports I also experience a feeling like a disconnection from my "self." Sometimes I am wandering the airport trying to find my "self." Strangely, there are moments at airports where I get this feeling as though I am unmoored from what connects me to other people. Honestly, I don't know if this is something only I experience or if others feel the same way.



There have been a slew of recent articles and social media posts written about how churches are dying and pastors are leaving and people are upset and no one goes to church anymore and so on. These posts are hard to read, and I wonder is this a sign that we are feeling unmoored? That we are searching for something? Or maybe it is simply being lost.

In the gospel of Luke, Jesus tells two parables – one about a lost sheep and one about a lost coin (Luke 15:1-10). You probably remember these parables – the shepherd leaves the ninety-nine in search of the one. The woman turns over her entire house for the one coin that is missing from her purse. I think that traditionally we hear these parables as Jesus searching for the one who needs to hear the good news of Jesus for the very first time. But I think that is a misreading. The lost lamb was a part of the shepherd's flock. The lost coin was in the woman's purse. This story is for insiders. For those who know and yet have gotten lost.

This lostness might be of one's own volition. The sheep wanders from the prescribed pasture. But it can also be something that just happens. A coin cannot, on its own, get lost. We have all experienced the disruption of the pandemic, the cracks in our government, the warming of our climate causing suffering and death, and so much more. We notice changes in our churches and in our families and in our communities. Many of us have experienced personal troubles and tragedies. These all can lead to a sense of feeling adrift. And it can lead to fractures in our church community and our faith life.

However, the circumstance comes about – because of one's own actions or because of something that descends upon us - lostness occurs. And even when we know God's love and grace and comfort, even when we know that community is important, even when we are already part of God's community and church, we can still feel unmoored, lose our sense of belonging, our capacity to trust. We can get so lost that we don't know who we are or whose we are or where we belong anymore.

I don't know where you are at as you read this article today. Perhaps you are feeling snug with the other ninety-nine in the sheepfold of God. Perhaps you are a coin cozy with the other nine coins. But perhaps you are not. Perhaps you, too, are wondering and wandering. Perhaps you, too, are feeling disconnected from friends or family or your church community. Perhaps you, too, are wandering in Concourse C wondering how in the world you get to Concourse A. Perhaps you, too, are a sheep bleating for help or a coin under the couch cushions.

If this is you, the good news is that God is a searcher and a finder. The amazing news is that God is the shepherd hiking into the wilderness looking for you. The astounding news is that God is the housewife lighting her lamp and sweeping every corner in the house to find you. You are worth looking for. You are loved and desired. And when God finds you, there is rejoicing and laughter and a party! As Dan Erlander writes, "Love is God's action to bring us into abundant life – reconciled to God, to each other, and all creation!"

In the 2023-24 course offerings of the synod's LiVE Project there are many ways to be community together and the body of Christ together. There are ways to encourage and uplift one another. There are retreats, ongoing classes, and a year-long "Abide in the Word" Bible Study. (Learn more at https://www.lutheransnw.org/ministries/the-live-project) If you are feeling unmoored, lost, alone, adrift, I encourage you to first join in your community at your church and second, to join in the offerings in the wider synod. We are church together. We are journeying together. We get lost, and we get found, together.

Together we sing, "We once were lost but now we're found."

MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania

The new Pre-Form One class has arrived at MGLSS. We do not have an official number yet as some girls are still trickling in. They are enjoying the campus and the new friends they have made with their peers. An Operation Bootstrap Africa (OBA) group will attend the Form Four graduation in October to celebrate the 2023 class. There are 63 girls sitting for national exams, their results will not be available until 2024.

We have also learned from Avitus, the farm manager, that they harvested 44 metric tons of maize. They use 4 tons per month. Despite planting 3 times due to drought, they were able to grow enough maize to cover their needs. Nice job, Avitus! The Tuesday Morning Men's group (TMM) is helping to fund Avitus and the agricultural development at MGLSS, a terrific investment.

Collection Emphasis for Hopelink ~ October and November

This year, again, we will be packing Emergency Bags for the Hopelink Food Bank. So, during the months of October and November, we are collecting the food items to go in the Emergency Bags. Hopelink has asked that we pack "No-Cook" bags this year. The Bellevue food bank gets "Cook" bags from the Hopelink warehouse but has no supply of "No-




Cook" bags. They need these to support those with no access to cooking facilities (homeless).

The items in these bags need to be able to be eaten directly without being heated or the use of a can opener. ALL CANNED ITEMS MUST HAVE A POP-TOP LID. These need to be things that can be eaten cold and plain.

There are seven different items that go in each "No-Cook" Emergency Bag. We are collecting these items during October and November:

- 1 Peanut Butter (~16 ounce plastic jar no-stir)
- 1 Applesauce or Fruit Cups Package (packages of 4 or 6 cups [about 4 ounce cups], kept in original packaging so that it contains the label, ex: peaches, pears, fruit cocktail, applesauce)
- 2 Pouched Meat or Jerky (beef jerky or meat sticks [like slim Jims]; pouched meat like tuna, chicken, salmon [Starkist is a common brand]). Common sizes for both are about 3 ounces.
- 2 Canned Meals/Soups (examples: ~15-20 ounce chili, beef stew, canned ravioli, hearty Progresso soups such as: beef pot roast, chicken pot pie, Italian Wedding, etc.) - Pop-Top lid!
- 6 Granola Bars (look for ones that are at least 150 200 calories each total at least 1,000 calories)
- 5 Snack Items (high in calories and will not crush easily. Examples: dried fruit, nuts, trail mix. Individual packages – look for ones that are at least 100 – 150 calories each – total at least 500 calories)
- 2 Shelf-Stable Drinks (juice boxes are a good option.)

men (not all at the same time). Three of the men went on to housing, 14 were employed (3 with new jobs), and there were 15 at the end.

One more big Thank You to all of Saint Andrew's staff and members who provided support, groceries, meals, welcome cards and posters, and even new underwear. And a special Thank You to our hosting team for planning, setting up, and putting away. We worked together really well!

Lantern Hill, Mexico

So why Lantern Hill? What difference does this "after school tutoring program" really make? Is financial support from Saint Andrew's



really helping change lives for the better? A few things to consider: Less than 60% of kids in Mexico finish high school. Most end their schooling around age 15 due to financial reasons. As the children age, their school curriculum becomes more difficult and financial costs to continue schooling increase. Coupled with that fact, as the children grow older they become more capable of contributing to their family's financial status, whether that labor is through household duties or in the formal job market. It is very difficult to compete with immediate money compared to unrelatable long term financial stability, especially when the families are struggling to feed their families on a daily basis.

Lantern Hill currently supports meal provisions and tutoring services to 100 children ages 4-21. Without Lantern Hill, 40 of those children would most likely never get further than the first year of high school before dropping out. Instead, not only are kids completing high school, they are thinking bigger than their families ever thought possible, and are considering professional degrees including becoming teachers, dentists, and doctors. I cannot tell you how amazing it is to hear about their setting goals and watching them achieve so much more than what the norm has been within their community for generations. Additional goals for Lantern Hill include purchasing an additional building for expansion of the tutoring programs and providing more health clinics, and to establish additional scholarships to provide the necessary aide to help even more children get to university ~ because of you and your support, the goals being set for bettering the lives for our students just continues to become a reality; keeping kids in school is a dream that is a reality for so many more Mexican children.
