Where Do We See Life?

This is my Father's world; oh, let me not forget that, though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet. This is my Father's world; why should my heart be sad? The Lord is king, let heaven ring; God reigns, let the earth be glad! ELW Hymn 824

In January, I met with a colleague to read through the Sunday lessons for Lent and begin exploring themes within them for the season. It wasn't long before we both realized that one of their themes is death. In particular, death to the things we think mean power and greatness, death to selfishness, death to the societal structures that put people down, etc. This discovery then led us to ask, "In what way do these deaths lead to life?"

That question has remained with me. The "big" answer, of course, is that they lead us to life in Jesus. But I've found that that question has prompted me to ask another question, "Where do I see life?" and to consciously look for signs of life in my everyday living. Some signs are obvious, like the sound of birdsong or the gleeful squeal of the toddler who lives with her parents in the apartment across from me. Some of the signs aren't as easily noticed and might be missed if I'm not paying attention, such as the first bit of new growth on plants and shrubs indicating the passage of winter and the anticipation of spring.

We are still in what is, for some, a gloomy time of year with rain and shorter daylight hours. And with everything that's going on in our world – war, gun violence, political corruption, racial inequity, economic disparity, climate disasters – it's easy to become overwhelmed and unable to notice anything else.

But each day there are signs of life all around us. And within each day, there are multiple opportunities to discover it. Our life in Jesus opens our hearts to these discoveries and heightens our awareness of them.

As we continue in this season of Lent, may your day-to-day living be overflowing with the life that God has created in our world. May it bring you a sense of peace and calm, and also excitement for the possibilities that spring forth from it.



After attending this session, we hope you'll feel more comfortable talking to the people you trust with your care about your end-of-life wishes. Conversations that will help them know how to honor your values.

Bob Free is an EOLWA volunteer, former board president, and board member. He served on the End of Life Washington Advisory Committee for many years before joining the Board of Directors. Bob and other lawyers from his firm, MacDonald, Hoague & Bayless, generously provided many pro bono hours authoring seven amicus briefs on behalf of survivors of EOLWA clients. These briefs described for the courts the differing realities of what happens to families when a competent, terminally ill person is granted, or forbidden, the choice of aid in dying. Bob retired after 35 years of practicing law and enjoyed teaching immigration law at the University of Washington.

Discovering Discipleship ~ Cornerstone Ministry

In September of 2022 we started a new approach to confirmation: Cornerstone Ministry. The goal was simple: truly live into the baptismal promises made for each student; promises to raise them in faith, teach them the Bible, take them to worship, instruct them on the important parts of our faith, work for justice and peace, and many more. We wanted to not only model but embody those promises so that the confirmands have a good foundation on which to build their faith.

Through a lot of hard work, conversations, and prayer we came up with four cornerstones on which to build faith: Relationship, Discipleship, Worship, and Outreach. These reflect not only the core values of our church but the core values of our faith. To help establish these four cornerstones, we take a different approach to confirmation: to not just tell the youth what they need to know to take on their baptismal promises and live out their faith; we show them how to do it and help them along the way. Not only do youth learn about faith in the classroom but they learn through service, fellowship, and worship. Each cornerstone is of equal importance to the other.

Building up these four cornerstones is only one part of the faith life of our youth. Just like building a house, you have to start with a good foundation. The goal of Cornerstone Ministry is to work with the youth to deepen relationships in the church, grow in understanding of how to be a good disciple of Jesus, worship together as the Body of Christ, and go out into the world to share God's love. Health and Wholeness

Music and Healing

"Whenever the evil spirit from God bothered Saul, David would play his harp. Saul would relax and feel better, and the evil spirit would go away." 1 Samuel 16:23

This scripture from 1 Samuel 16 is an example in the Bible of music being used to calm a person's (King Saul) severe case of anxiety. David, playing his harp, could then be seen as one of the earliest examples of a person fitting the role of a kind of music therapist. And yet, we know that references to music's calming and renewing power is not unique to this passage alone.

From Ephesians: "Sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to each other; sing to the Lord and make music in your heart to him." Paul's instructions here result in the refreshment of the spirit and the relief of anxiety. Paul specifically says to make music from your **heart**, meaning to engage in full and all-consuming worship of God through music.

A few months ago, Health and Wholeness Ministry asked me to write a short piece about healing through music, using a scriptural reference. This little article could have gone in a dozen different directions including putting you to sleep by relating the effects of music on the human mind by quoting references from my doctoral level class I took on the "Psychology of Music", which used scientific method, studies, and statistics. Or I could have discussed the nationally recognized music therapy program at one of my alma maters, The University of Louisville. The music therapy program is a great help for people with a range of mental or physical challenges/illnesses like PTSD, anxiety, depression; whereby they are treated as part of a holistic regimen through music; writing music, singing, dancing to music, drawing what they hear, etc. I believe this music program has great merit and is somewhat new to the world of medicine and psychology. Instead, I want to limit the scope of this piece to sacred references and personal anecdotes. Throughout this article, I am certain you too can think of several examples of your own that exhort us to worship God in music and musical references found all throughout the Bible, songs, or hymns of healing.

Many of us today, when life gets a bit messy and we need to find some solace, may turn on the radio, or stream a tune on the computer. Or perhaps after having a long or trying day, we relax with jazz or classical music, or rock, or whatever your pleasure is. Or when things trouble us, we go straight for a specific favorite song to calm ourselves. Or perhaps we sing a hymn or song about God and Jesus. There are so many examples of pieces in the church of how God and Jesus heal us and make us whole. Our ELW hymnal alone has 32 hymns listed under the heading of "Healing". "Balm in Gilead" and "It is Well with My Soul" are some of my favorites. What are some of yours?

My definition of "healing" also includes the act of the worship of God as a source of healing of our souls, minds, and body, so by my understanding, the entire hymnal is a book of healing. An antidote to anxiety, depression, fear - according to scripture - is to worship and pray to God. From Philippians, "Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Perhaps singing a song of Thanksgiving to God would help?

Even songs that we sing during memorial services serve to worship God and act in a cathartic way for us to mourn and celebrate a person and that person's life in God. I know several of you mentioned how you teared up when we all sang "Amazing Grace" a few Sundays ago. Those tears can have so much meaning. They can be tears of healing, or joy, or sadness. And yet, if we only were to have spoken the text, I don't think it would have had the same impact as when we sang it. Take a movie for example. Remove the music score from the film and very often the scene or even the whole movie seems flat and lifeless.

About 20 years ago I was playing a service at a large Methodist church in Muncie, Indiana. I was feeling kind of blah that day and had just finished my postlude on the very large organ there. A woman rushed into where the organ console was after I finished and told me the postlude I just played spoke to her and she felt better. She went on to relate her recent life events as she cried, trying to get the words out. Believe me, I didn't do anything out of the ordinary, but that day a piece of music, no words, a fugue by Bach, was exactly what this woman needed to hear. I have never forgotten that day. I personally felt rejuvenated by being able to give a little something to this person, if only for a brief moment. A God moment, for sure. I often think back to this occurrence and it sustains me, even when I occasionally feel like what I'm doing doesn't have much meaning.

Music is a gift from God then, meant for us to engage in and be refreshed with.

The direction of putting sacred scripture to music is in the Bible. The Psalms were intended to be sung. Throughout Lent, we are doing just that. It doesn't matter if it's perfect. In fact, as Paul writes, sing from the heart to God. There is a healing that happens when we engage in this form of worship. We recognize our own weakness and brevity and turn over our cares, our anxieties, and or lives to God. We can come away renewed in spirit, knowing that God is watching over us protecting us, as God has promised.

As Lutherans, our tradition of engaging in singing in worship goes back to Martin Luther, who was a musician and believed strongly in congregational singing. Luther gave us the gift of singing hymns in worship. Luther said "the person who sings, prays twice." Much of Luther's theology is best written in the text of his hymns. As a young boy of about eight years old, my father told me after the singing of "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" in our Presbyterian church in Kentucky, "Son, this a very powerful hymn written by a great man, listen to the words!" I had never seen him get so emotional about a hymn and I thought it a bit odd at the time. He later tried to tell me about Luther and his theology. I was pretty young and much of it was beyond me, BUT, it has stuck with me through all these many years. When I think of my father, I think very often of him telling me the story of Luther and his struggles through the music of "A Mighty Fortress" that Sunday so long ago, and I am reconnected with my dad, less sad of his absence, and healed and strengthened by the worship of an eternal triune God through the marriage of song, text, and theology.

A framed quote given to me several years ago by our departed friend, Bernhard Siemens, encourages me often. It reads, "For Heights and Depths no words can reach, music is the soul's own speech!"

I close with the words of J.S. Bach "Soli Deo Gloria" "To God alone, goes the glory!" 👚

They brought wisdom, guidance, leadership, and a spirit-led devotion to their roles. I am incredibly grateful for all that they have done, and are continuing to do, on behalf of Saint Andrew's. Please let them know how much you appreciate how much they do.

Dan Johnson and **Tom Getzinger** were elected to another term on Council. We appreciate their willingness to dedicate their time and talent yet again to serve Saint Andrew's.

Our two newest Council members are **Dave Vossler** and **Johannes Grad**. Their contributions will be highly impactful. Please thank ALL of your Council members for their willingness to serve and make a difference.

In our February Council meeting, we elected new officers. I was re-elected as President; **Tom Getzinger** is now our Vice President, and **Johannes Grad** is our Secretary. We also reaffirmed **Bill Brueggemann** as Treasurer. It should be noted that our Constitution limits officers of Council to no more than two consecutive years. Having served as President for the last two years, I was technically ineligible. However, Council voted to make an exception for this year to allow me to continue the work in furthering the connections between our Cluster churches. I will be terming off Council at the end of this year so you will most assuredly get another President for 2025.

Council Youth Representative

Just after our Annual Meeting, **Abby Kasper** volunteered to be our Youth Representative for Council. We are so very grateful for her willingness to attend our meetings to provide her perspectives. We look forward to having her share her observations and insights with us as well as communicating back to the youth what she has learned in her experience with the Council.

Committee Liaisons

With the start of a new Council, we are refreshing the Committee Liaison assignments of Council members. I expect that most stay with the assignments that were in place for 2023, but there will be a few changes. **Dave Vossler** has requested to be liaison to the Health and Wholeness Ministry Committee, **Johannes Grad** will liaison with the Communications Committee, and **Dan Johnson** will attend the Outreach and Servant Ministries Committee meetings as Council Rep.

Bellevue Church Collaboration – (Bellevue Blend?)

On January 27, the clergy and Councils for Saint Andrew's, Saint Luke's, and Cross of Christ met to explore how we might grow together in ways to strengthen our missional impact and better steward our resources. There is genuine excitement where this might lead.

I met with **Colin Walker** (President, Cross of Christ) and **Judy Buckmaster** (President, Saint Luke's) following the January 27 meeting. We agreed that the next step would be to form a Task Force with people from each of the three parishes to help discern and prioritize various workstreams that can help us figure out how to best move forward. Each of the Council Presidents will serve on this Task Force, but we need to identify two additional individuals from each parish to serve with the group. We have scheduled the first meeting of the Task Force for March 9, so we need to finalize our delegates by the end of February. It should be noted that the Task Force will be asked to explore various ways that our congregations can work more closely together, but those recommendations will be brought back to the respective committees, congregations, and Councils for any decision-making. This work must be as inclusive and transparent as possible. If you would be interested in serving on this Task Force, please let me know.

I expect that we will have most, if not all, of the Cluster pastors participate in this Task Force to learn from them as well as pave future pathways among all of the churches within the Cluster. We will also have two coaches from the Synod work with us. **Jane Prestbye** and **Gary Rothenburger** will bring great insight and guidance as we discern our path forward.

This work will change us as a body of Christ. We hope we can broaden our mission and our impact, thoughtfully steward our many resources, and create new and lasting connections within the community as we do God's work, but we certainly don't have all of the answers. This is new to all of us. We would enormously appreciate your thoughts and concerns and prayerful support as we journey down this path together.

Abby shares her inspirational story of how Lantern Hill began and her vision for the future during the Discipleship /Education Hour. Following the church service, there is a delicious lunch provided by a kind and generous donor, and time spent in fellowship and conversation as well as opportunities to purchase Mexican pottery, jewelry made by Abby, and bags/purses created by families of students. Additionally, there are bricks representing what is needed to build a bigger school and safe play space on the newly purchased property. My gratitude to Jean Wahlstrom, Sherry Grindeland, Sharon Gurtel, and Mayolo Piñeda for sharing his beautiful music during worship. It is such a special and memorable day and I am so appreciative.

Background of the Ministry of Lantern Hill

Lantern Hill (LH) is called Linterna del Camino and is an Education Community Center in Canon Buena Vista, Mexico, which is a reservation community outside the city of Ensenada. The LH mission statement is: *Breaking the cycle of poverty through education, nutrition and care.* We believe it is through these things that lives can change and families can break out of the cycle of poverty. Lantern Hill is a non-profit organization with roots in the ELCA Lutheran church and was founded in 2007 by JJ and Abby Williams. What started as a tutoring program for 8 children on a hillside now takes place in a beautiful yellow school that greets everyone as they arrive to the impoverished community. Today the school serves 100 children who range in age from 4 to 24 - including four in university, one completing law school, and one currently in dental school. In addition to after school tutoring, Lantern Hill provides summer schooling and a year-round feeding program.

Saint Andrew's involvement with Lantern Hill began in 2019 with the mission trip that sent the "Mexico 12", a mix of adults and high school youth, to spend time living amongst and working with the staff and children there. It was such a positive and influential experience that as a group we felt strongly that the mission and the people served needed their story to be told, our experience shared, and that efforts could be made to continue supporting them financially. Additionally, Shana Nielsen became a board member of the Friends of Lantern Hill in January 2020, and she and her family have since returned to Lantern Hill to proudly serve and represent Saint Andrew's.

Outreach and Servant Ministries MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania



Sixty-four (64) young ladies have begun Form 1 at MGLSS this year. Their ages range from 11 to 16 years old. They have completed the pre-form 1 program and were very excited on January 7 when their formal secondary education began.

Additionally, for the first time ever, a "Pre-Form 5 Program" has begun. It is a 10-month program that helps the young ladies who graduate Form 4 remain safe on campus during their long break. This program nourishes life skills as well as leadership skills. Career practice and research are also part of the curriculum. We are excited to see how the young ladies respond to the program. Our shared goal is to negate the loss of young women to an arranged marriage during the long break. On average, 30% of young ladies do not return to MGLSS after graduating Form 4.

During the cold snap in January, I realized that the hummingbird food had frozen again. I went outside to replace it and noticed a hummingbird just sitting, seemingly frozen, perched on one of the little prongs of the feeder. Now, usually the hummingbirds I feed are fierce. They swirl around my head demanding new syrup and for me to move out of their way. They exert a force that, if bigger, would be scary. But this one did nothing as I moved closer.

I stood there. Not sure what to do. Do I shoo it away? Do I simply hope it moves when I reach out? Do I come back later hoping this bird is still alive?

As in most things we do these days, I decided to research online. According to the website *Science*, hummingbirds may appear "frozen" on a feeder, but they're using torpor to conserve energy. This article urges one to not disturb them as this is a natural behavior and allows them to save their energy.

With this, I decided to wait until the hummingbird flew off before replacing the feeder with fresh syrup (which happened about a half hour later).

So why tell you this small story of hummingbirds and me? I think there is some overlap between energy and torpor and what this all might mean for us as church together.

While not a perfect analogy, sometimes we can act like hummingbirds swirling and swooping, using lots of energy to do things. Sometimes we think that if we aren't doing activities, or if other people aren't doing activities, then we are failing as a church. It reminds me of a pastor saying to me at an event for Rostered Ministers, "Bishop, I feel that I have to attend everything that is planned. But, may I ask, is everything planned necessary?"

Perhaps we use energy up when it is not necessary.

Perhaps, like the hummingbird, we also need a time of torpor. Perhaps we need a "time out" time or a reflection time or a meditative time or just a time to inhale and exhale without worrying about the next event or program or activity. As theologian Richard Rohr puts it when describing centering prayer, "Prayer is simply sitting in silence, open to God's love and your love for God. This prayer is beyond thoughts, emotions, or sensations."

Dear Beloveds in Christ, Lent is here. As we plan and attend the meaningful worship and fellowship that we all love during the season of Lent, I pray that in worship and in other ways you can find the space and openness to embrace the wonder of the Spirit.

For we can learn from hummingbirds – not that we are to eat one and a half to three times our body weight every day like a hummingbird – but instead, we are called to have a flow between busyness and stillness, action and reflection, hustling and torpor, acts and prayer.

I pray that as we follow Jesus, as we live in Jesus' love, as we contemplate his words and actions, we may do the same. *In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed.* Mark 1:35 Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee | bishop@lutheransnw.org **(f)**
