Sowing Seeds

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers... All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need.

Acts 2:42-47 paraphrased

Four years ago, at this time, we had just gone into quarantine. We were advised to leave our homes only when necessary, so we learned to do things differently. Inperson activities, from grocery shopping to checking in on each other, meant wearing a mask and keeping socially distanced.

At church, we learned how to navigate worship, Bible study, fellowship, and meetings online. Our scripture readings came to life in ways that they hadn't before. Everything was unexpectedly new.

That newness continued as things opened back up and we discovered that "normal" as we once knew it was gone and would not come back. In many ways, we are still discovering how much life has changed in the wake of the pandemic.

Our experience isn't unlike the disciples learning how to live without Jesus at their side. For them, life changed when Christ was arrested and then crucified. And it changed even more three days later when he rose from the dead.

The disciples' faith and trust in Jesus held them together as a community and sowed the seeds of the early church. Those seeds were sown through the centuries, and are still being sown today. The fruit that they yield is made visible in our lives and we, in turn, sow more seeds for future generations.

From these seeds, new life springs forth – sometimes unexpectedly. One of the many things that the pandemic revealed is how much the church has changed, and the ways God is working through those changes in and among us.

Two years ago, we began having conversations with our sibling ELCA congregations in the East King County Cluster to discern how we might collaborate and partner together in ministry. Since then, collaborations have been happening in a variety of ways such as the Tiny Home Build last summer, game nights, and a pulpit exchange (more of those are coming soon!)

The momentum toward partnership has been increasing, and we are now in conversation with St. Luke's Lutheran Church and Cross of Christ Lutheran Church to determine how we might unite as one organization while retaining our individual identities. For details on the most recent conversation, I invite you to read Carolynn Ferris' President's Corner on page 12.

These conversations, these partnerships, are revealing the seeds that we are each sowing for the sake of the gospel and the abundance of fruit that can spring forth from them if we work together. As we navigate the possibilities before us, may we trust that God is at work in the new life that will come from them.

Several hundred young people will be here to perform and learn in adjudicated sessions with reputable musicians.


The dates for the Festival are Tuesday-Saturday, April 2-6, with 5 public concerts to follow.


Join Women's Early Book Study (WEBS) Spring Session

- Cut 11-inch quilt squares at home using washable fabrics. Dorcas has a lot of fabric that you can bring home from church to cut into quilt squares.
- Lutheran World Relief does not accept quilts that have any flags or religious symbols.
- Sew quilt tops at home. Quilts need to be 60 inches by 80 inches.
- Donate crochet or embroidery thread (any color) to tie quilts.



Health and Wholeness

Burn Prevention

Turns can affect how we move, look, and feel about ourselves. These **D**injuries can happen in seconds, but recovery can take weeks, months, or years. Do not be afraid to call 911. "Each year, 500,000 people seek medical treatment for burn injuries in the U.S., and an estimated 72% of burns occur at home, according to the ABA (American Burn Association)."

Preventing burns while cooking:

- Turn pot handles *in* when cooking at the stove.
- Cook on the *back* burners of the stove when possible.
- When frying, use a pot lid or splash guard to prevent grease splatter.
- Do not leave food cooking unattended on the stove, unless you are *sure* it is safe.
- Wear short sleeves or tight-fitting clothes when cooking at the stove.
- Keep the stovetop clear of paper, towels, and anything that can burn.
- If a grease fire occurs:
 - o Turn off the stove, and smother the fire with a lid.
 - o Do not move the pan or lid, leave it in place.
 - o Never use water to put out a grease fire.
- If an oven fire occurs, turn off the oven and close the door.
- Do not use a stove or oven to heat your home!

Preventing burns around the house:

- ★ Set the water heater temperature on the hot water heater to a maximum of 120F.
- ★ Place candles on a solid surface and never leave them unattended (or use battery candles).
- ★ Keep young children away from the stove, oven, and BBQ.
- ★ Place plastic plug covers on unused electrical outlets.

Personal Care Kits Outreach Continues through April

Phroughout Lent, the Health and Wholeness Ministry Committee has been collecting articles to be put into Personal Care Kits for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). The kits are sent to areas of the world where emergency supplies are needed.

Northwest Washington Synod

In fifth grade, I started playing trumpet. This wasn't the instrument that I chose – it was chosen for me because my aunt had an old trumpet and my mom said, "If you want to be in band, you can use this trumpet." But even though I wanted to play the flute, the trumpet was definitely the instrument for me. I loved playing trumpet. I loved the sound, the way to make different notes with just three valves, using different mutes that produced complexity of tone. I loved to polish and clean my trumpet – especially when I received a new silver trumpet in high school. The only thing I didn't like was carrying it to and from school because of the big hill that we lived on.



In high school I was in both band and jazz band. In jazz band we traveled to many competitions – winning the Reno Jazz Festival one year. When I look back on my experience in band, I realize that there are so many things that I continue to apply in my life, and as part of the body of Christ, that go back to being in band.

First, you can't be a band on your own. If you play a solo instrument, that is lovely. But that isn't a band. There needs to be a group to form a band – it can be small or large – but an agreement that you are engaging with one another and playing music with one another leads to forming a band. If you are using music, the same music is important – also the same key and the same beats per measure helps. An agreement on how fast or slow the tempo is important. In short, community is needed for a band.

Second, you can't all play the same instrument. I mean, I love the trumpet – but a band of trumpets is one-dimensional (and can be very loud). I admit that as much as I love brass, you need more than brass to form a band. We have all heard brass quartets – but for a band, you need the saxophone, the piccolo, the clarinet, the drum, and so much more. Diversity is needed in a band.

Third, you can't drown out others. I speak as one who plays trumpet. Trumpets know how to be loud. And if trumpeters are not careful, they will hide the beauty of the other instruments. There is nothing more gorgeous than notes from an oboe coming from seemingly nowhere to fill the air with that wistful, haunting sound. In other words, listen for the woodwinds. A variety of sounds and voices are needed in a band – especially those that are more hidden.

Fourth, harmony doesn't mean the same note. It would be boring if every single instrument played the very same note for every song in a band's repertoire. Our ears are tuned to hear melody, harmony, dissonance, and resolution. In a band, it is imperative that different notes are played – different rhythm patterns are introduced, and a play amongst the instruments happens. Harmony and dissonance are needed in a band.

Dear people of God, these four things are also needed in the church and in the world: Community, diversity, variety of sound and voice, harmony and dissonance. I invite you to think about your worshiping community. How are we all like a band? How can we be more intentional in these four areas?

Our composer and maestro is God – God is directing and leading us – in the music we co-create. May this spring awaken you in the beauty and grace of God. May the community in which you gather bring music in all its fullness.

President's Corner

Cluster Church Collaboration - Bellevue Steering Committee

As you likely know, for the past year or two we have been exploring ideas on how we might work more collaboratively with the churches in our Cluster. The goal is to increase our missional impact and better steward our resources. (As a reminder, Cluster churches include Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ, Saint Luke's, Our Savior, Sammamish Hills, and Mount Si Lutheran Churches). There has been much progress – joint youth events are taking place regularly, the pastors will soon be sharing pulpit duty within the Cluster, and Vacation Bible School will be run collectively this summer.

We recognized that there is an opportunity to move things forward even more effectively if the three Bellevue churches were to be more intentional about working together as one. Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ and Saint Luke's are relatively close to one another, and the clergy and lay leadership are on board to explore bold ideas to see where God may be leading us in this effort. Therefore, we formed a "Bellevue Churches Steering Committee" to discern what a new future might look like.

We held our first meeting of the Steering Committee on Saturday, March 9. We had representation from each Bellevue church consisting of the pastor, president, and at least two additional lay leaders. In addition, two coaches from the Synod joined us to help guide us in our deliberations and foster healthy dialogue.

Tom Getzinger and **Jean Wahlstrom** volunteered to participate on the Steering Committee on behalf of Saint Andrew's. I am very grateful for their wisdom and commitment to this effort.

We started our time together in this meeting getting grounded in scripture. Pastor Mark Griffith (Saint Luke's) shared the story of Jesus feeding the crowd of 5,000 followers having nothing more than seven loaves of bread and a few small fish. It was a powerful reminder of how God creates abundance out of very little. We also reflected on a passage in Acts where the apostles gave up their possessions to feed the poor and to support one another in their mission to spread the gospel. We immediately grasped the significance of giving up what we consider belongs to us to create something even more impactful.

As we shared our dreams and visions for what might be possible, we came to realize that what we wanted was to come together as one body, unified in our faith and commitment to serve our community. There is no intention to merge or close any of the congregations. We want to create something altogether new – an inclusive faith community that shares resources, talents and gifts while recognizing the unique identities and local connections of each parish. In this vision, Pastors would be based in their "home" church but serve the larger faith community as a team. We would work collectively to be more impactful in all areas of our ministry. Each location may be the focal point for their areas of strength but still be a part of a larger faith confederation.

After much discernment, we developed three primary work streams to move us forward in the coming months:

- 1) Governance: If the idea of creating a new, unified faith community is to happen, we need to construct a model that reflects our vision. We need to develop a governance structure whereby elected lay leaders can provide leadership for the larger faith community while ensuring the needs of the individual parishes are met. We will also need to come up with a new Constitution that will align with the new entity.
- 2) Finances and Staffing: Another group will be looking at what opportunities could be generated if we consider combining our financial and staffing resources. If we pool our funding and staffing talent, we believe we can amplify our missional reach and have an even greater impact in our communities how better to make visible the love of God.
- 3) Mission Engagement: This effort will be focused on in-reach and outreach. We hope to provide opportunities for members from all of the congregations within the larger faith community to come together in fellowship, worship, and service. And think about what we could accomplish if we worked in unison to support our community partners!

Due to a few pending decisions that need to be made within the Cluster in the relative near term, we have given ourselves a window of approximately six to eight months to craft a model of what might be created with the three Bellevue churches while setting up the potential to expand within the entire Cluster. At the end of this window of time, we hope to be able to have congregations decide whether it is a "Go or No Go" on moving forward.

As we pursue this work, we will pull in others who have expertise, passion, and a willingness to dream. If you are interested in learning more about our collaboration efforts or have something you would like to share or contribute, please do reach out to Pastor Lara, myself, Tom Getzinger, or Jean Wahlstrom.

Please pray for us. Ask God to guide our deliberations and open our eyes to where He is taking us. Ask for inspiration and strength; courage and perseverance; wisdom and steadfast love.



Who is KidVantage (formerly known as Eastside Baby Corner):

KidVantage helps children have what they need to grow, play, learn and thrive. They do this by providing essential care, safety and health goods for children who are experiencing the stresses of economic insecurity, systemic inequities, or family disruption.

Over the last couple of years, KidVantage has seen a significant increase in the number of households depending on them to provide basic needs to ensure healthy happy children. These items include free diapers/wipes, formula, clothing, car seats, household goods (sheets/towels/blankets), school supplies, and enrichment through toys, books, and crafts. Diapers are so expensive for some families that they resort to hanging disposable diapers on the clothesline to reuse them.

Saint Andrew's currently supports KidVantage in a number of ways in addition to those mentioned above:

- The Love Tree during the holidays supports KidVantage with requests for new or gently used clothing, coats, and new
 toys for the holiday bags.
- Saint Andrew's had a congregation volunteer event at KidVantage in early December 2023. We plan to do it again in 2024.
- Members can contribute their time by volunteering or becoming a core volunteer at the Issaquah Hub! Two of our members are weekly volunteers.

Some Background on KidVantage:

KidVantage, formerly called Eastside Baby Corner, was founded in 1990 by Karen Ridlon. Her background as a pediatric nurse practitioner gave her insight into what kids need for healthy development and what families need to care for their children. With a broken playpen, a few other donated items, grit, determination, and a community network, Karen started KidVantage. Over the past 31 years, KidVantage has grown from Karen's dining room to three locations in King and Kitsap counties.

More than 80 school districts, health and human service organizations, early learning centers, and food banks are in the KidVantage collaborative network.

Kids, ages birth through 12, get shoes, diapers, formula, blankets, coats, toys and much more from KidVantage and service partners. KidVantage also provides for expectant and postpartum mothers, supplying maternity wear, personal care goods, and mother-infant support items. Kids are warm, healthy, safe and better prepared to fulfill their own potential.



MaaSAE Girls Lutheran Secondary School (MGLSS), Tanzania

We continue to provide scholarship support for Witness Edward Kivuyo for her third and final year at City College Kigamboni as she pursues a Diploma in Pharmaceutical Science. OBA has also sent more information about Catherine, our second scholarship student. Catherine has begun her first year of three, studying for a B. Navajo Evangelical Lutheran Mission (NELM)

The mission school continues to teach 20 students in Grades K-3, utilizing three new fifteen passenger Ford transit vans, arriving in December. Now they need your extra help to pay for them.

Their **food bank** continues to serve more than 2000 families and distributed more than 400,000 pounds of food in 2023. The **Hozho Café** daily serves an average of 70 meals. The **water well** distributes more than 10,000 gallons of water per week.

For the first time in their seventy-year history, they are training their own faith leaders called **Wisdom Keepers**. They have attended theological classes and other training courses for the last two years and were installed as pastoral leaders at House of Prayer Lutheran by the Grand Canyon Bishop. In addition to this role, **Patterson Yazzie** is now the first Navajo Executive Director. We praise and thank God for these gifted leaders. **Pray for them** as they carry a heavy load in serving the needs of the Navajo communities. For many families in a 60-mile radius, they are the only organization providing basic essentials..
