God Hears Us

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear! What a privilege to carry ev'rything to God in prayer! ELW Hymn 742

I've shared this with you before, but one of the deep-seated memories of my childhood is my dad praying every morning. As his day began, he sat in his chair at the table with his coffee, Bible, and the current *Christ in Our Home* devotional booklet. He spent 10-15 minutes silently reading, reflecting on the day's lesson, and praying. It was an unwritten rule that we not disturb him during that time because it was his time with God. I eventually learned that that time set the tone for his day, and even in retirement it is still his daily practice.

In the article that I put together for Health and Wholeness (see page 6), I note that our spiritual health and wholeness is equally as important as our physical health and that for us, as Christians, prayer is a significant part of our spiritual health. Whether our days are unimaginably busy or mind-numbingly mundane, or when the news cycle gets the best of us, prayer helps keep us grounded and tethered to God.

When I talk with people about prayer, we often end up talking about which words we should use or whether there's a "proper" way or time to pray. The short answer is there are no specific words to use, and there's no right or wrong way or time to pray.

The longer answer is that there are as many different ways to pray as there are people in the world. Some people pray by speaking or whispering words with their heads bowed and hands folded. Some pray when they create art. Some pray when they sing or play a musical instrument. Some people pray during their commute. Others pray when they fall silent and listen to the sound of God's presence in nature. I once knew someone who prayed while she folded socks.

In whatever way you pray, and whenever you pray, be assured that Jesus knows what's in your heart and that God hears you.

We'll be barbecuing hot dogs and providing the buns, condiments, potato salad, and baked beans.



Health and Wholeness

Prayer

Hear my prayer, O Lord; give ear to my supplications in your faithfulness; answer me in your righteousness. Psalm 143:1

When we think about health and wholeness, we often focus on the physical aspects of what that means. But spiritual health and wholeness is equally as important and, as Christians, prayer is a significant part of our spiritual health. While we most often pray from our heart, speaking whatever words come to mind, in certain situations it's helpful to have some prayers that are already written. Most of these are prayers that are prayed with or for someone, but they can easily be prayed by an individual person.

Prayer before a medical procedure or surgery: Loving God, we pray for your protection for <u>name</u> as they face this procedure/surgery. Guide the hands of the medical teams, that all may go as it should – without complication or infection. Comfort <u>name's</u> family as they watch and wait. May they all know the presence of your loving care. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.

Prayer of thanksgiving following a medical procedure or surgery: We give you thanks, O God, that <u>name's</u> surgery was successful. Continue to watch over *him/her/them*, and grant *him/her/them* patience as they heal and recover. We ask this in Christ's name. Amen.

Prayer for beginning an extended course of treatment: O God, who in Jesus stills the storm and soothes the troubled heart, bring hope and courage to <u>name</u> as <u>she/he/they</u> wait in uncertainty. Give <u>him/her/them</u> courage to endure all that is ahead, for you are our refuge and strength. You are God and we need you. We pray in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. (*ELW Pastoral Care*)

Prayer for caregivers: God, our refuge and strength, our present help in time of trouble, care for those who tend the needs of others. Strengthen them in body and spirit. Refresh them when weary; console them when anxious; comfort them in grief; and hearten them in discouragement. Be with us all, and give us peace at all times and in every way; through Christ our peace. Amen. *(ELW Pastoral Care)*

Prayer for entering hospice care: Holy and life-giving God, whose mercy is without end, look with grace upon <u>name</u> [and *her/his/their* family and friends] as *they face* the future. Guide those who will accompany *her/him/them* in the days to come, so that *name* will be cared for and comforted. Uphold them all in your abiding love, and sustain them with your peace, which surpasses all understanding; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. *(ELW Pastoral Care)*

Prayer for healing and wholeness: God of compassion, your Son Jesus Christ, the great physician, made the broken whole and healed the sick. Touch our wounds, relieve our hurts, and restore to us wholeness of life, through the same Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. *(ELW Pastoral Care)*

Personal prayer for someone experiencing loneliness: Merciful God, in the stillness of my soul I listen for your voice to know again that you are God. Quiet my restless heart with the knowledge that you are near me, keeping watch over your own. Rekindle my faith and light the lamp of hope within my heart. Then take me by the hand into each day that lies ahead, for where you lead I can confidently go with Jesus Christ my Lord. Amen. *(ELW Prayerbook for the Armed Services)*

Personal prayer for someone who is in despair: God of all hope, I confess that there are many times I find it hard to hold on to hope. The problems seem huge and without solution. Often I dread each new day and wonder if I can take another step into the future without fear. Yet you have promised to be with me always. Do not abandon me now. Come to me by your Spirit and lead me to a new day of hope. Amen. *(ELW Prayerbook for the Armed Services)*

Other things to keep in mind:

- When you are praying with or for someone, honesty is important. Acknowledge whatever emotion they may be feeling in that moment and express that in the prayer.
- There are prayers in the Bible, including: Psalm 23, Psalm 27, Psalms 146-150, and the Lord's Prayer. It's also helpful to pray using the words and/or music from your favorite hymn. Listening to and for God's voice, and even crying (and sobbing, and yelling) are forms of prayer, too.

Remember, too, that there is no right or wrong way to pray. And in the times when words fail us and we don't know what to pray, we are assured that God's Spirit intercedes on our behalf (Romans 8:26-27).

KnitWits

S aint Andrew's KnitWits (Knitting as Witnesses) is a fellowship group whose primary mission is to provide items of comfort that are knit or crocheted. Their on-going projects include prayer shawls, baptismal blankets, lapghans, baby blankets, baby booties, chemo caps, hats, wash cloths, sweaters, and scarves. The work of the KnitWits' hands keeps many people warm and reminds them that someone cares.

Climate Change is Bad for our Health

Human health and wellbeing are inextricably intertwined with the health and wellbeing of God's creation. God created a "goldilocks" planet that is just right for human flourishing and charged us with the responsibility to care for it.

Yet we have failed to execute that responsibility, putting the health of God's creation at grave risk. The United Nations has announced a "code red" for the planet. In a hospital, "code red" is reserved for cardiac arrest or similar incidents where the life of the patient is at immediate risk. The planetary vital sign to watch is the level of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. From analyzing air bubbles trapped in glacial ice, scientists have learned that CO2 never exceeded 280 parts per million (PPM) for 800,000 years. Then it shot up to 425 PPM in just 100 years. The earth's temperature is rising as a result. To bring down the earth's fever, scientists agree that we must stop burning fossil fuels. Instead, we set new records for greenhouse gas emissions in 2023.

Human health is already suffering from climate change. The World Health Organization defines climate change as "the single biggest health threat facing humanity", noting that "over 90 per cent of people breathe unhealthy levels of air pollution, largely resulting from burning fossil fuels driving climate change". Climate change is causing more heat-related illnesses, cardiopulmonary illnesses like asthma, food, water, and insect-borne diseases, and mental health problems such as anxiety, depression, and post-traumatic stress disorders. The June 2021 Heat Dome in our region caused hundreds of deaths related to heat exposure. Concern about climate change coupled with worry about the future is causing



more people to experience fear, anger, powerlessness, exhaustion, stress, and sadness. All these health problems are having the greatest impact on vulnerable populations who have done the least to contribute to climate change.

"Physician, heal thyself" is an ancient proverb appearing in Luke 4:23. We have the cure for what ails our planet. Clean energy is now the cheapest form of energy the world has ever known. Each one of us must help administer the cure by switching from fossil fuel to electricity to heat and cool our homes and power our transportation. Both our health and the health of the God's creation depend on it.

President's Corner

Worship and Liturgical Arts / Music Name Change

The Worship and Liturgical Arts (WLA) committee requested that their name be changed to "Worship and Music" to more clearly reflect the work that they do. Because the original name was a part of the Continuing Resolutions in our Constitution, Council needed to vote to approve this change. This was done in our May Council meeting and from now on, you will see this committee referred to as Worship and Music.

Silver Oak Montessori School - Due Diligence

Recently, we were approached by the Silver Oak Montessori School about the possibility of renting space in our South Hall. After taking a tour of our facilities, they let us know that they were very interested in renting six of the classrooms on the lower floor of that wing. Silver Oak Montessori would likely start with approximately 25 children from 1 - 5 - 1/2 years of age but may increase that number in the coming years. They hope to be able to open their school at our location in September of this year. Their mission is particularly attractive as they serve lower-income families. This aligns very well with our mission to "Grow together in Christ to love and serve all people". Council has endorsed continuing to pursue the possibility of leasing this space.

As you likely remember when we were working with the Emerald Heights Academy, we need to determine what, if any, building improvements need to be made if were to lease the space. To help us determine these requirements, we engaged Poppi Handy, managing partner for Third Place Design, to help us. She and an associate are working with the City of Bellevue to determine what upgrades need to be made to qualify as an "E" (Education) occupancy for that area of our building.

They have completed a preliminary review of City code and believe that religiously owned properties can house an Educational use "by right" – meaning it is already allowed by Code. If this is the case, we will not have to get a Conditional Use Permit. (This is a big deal as that process is expensive and very time-consuming). Poppi is working to schedule a meeting with City staff to get a final ruling on what will be required to allow Silver Oak Montessori to lease our space.

We do not yet know how much revenue would be generated, nor do we have certainty about what, if any, building improvements may need to be made to accommodate them. However, if we do want to enter into a lease with the Montessori School, the congregation must vote to authorize the Council or Executive Committee to work out the terms of the lease. At our Semi-Annual meeting (date to be determined), this topic will likely be discussed and potentially voted upon.

Cluster Partnership Statement of Support

In our May Council meeting, we discussed and approved making a formal statement supporting the work that is being done to explore ways we might be in partnership with other churches in our Cluster.

This statement reads as follows:

Lay leaders and Pastors for the Lutheran churches in East King County (Saint Andrew's, Cross of Christ, St. Luke's, Our Savior, Mt. Si and Sammamish Hills) have been meeting over the past three years to discuss how we can work more closely together to be more effective witnesses for Christ in East King County, serve our communities more impactfully, and better steward our resources. All churches are experiencing declining attendance and giving, and fewer families are joining our congregations. We have experienced these trends for over two decades, but the pace accelerated during the COVID epidemic. Each church is also facing critical staffing decisions. It is time to find a new path forward rather than simply hoping that things will get better.

The leadership of the three Bellevue churches (Saint Andrew's, St. Luke's, and Cross of Christ) recognize that we have the advantage of being relatively close to one another and that we may be more poised than the remaining churches to take meaningful steps forward in exploring what might be possible in coming together in partnership for mission. Pastors, representatives from Council, and several key stakeholders are meeting regularly to develop more specific plans for how we can collaborate and potentially redefine how we "do church". Our hope is that we can set the stage for this partnership in the hopes that the other churches within our Cluster will join when and if they are ready.

We understand that there is a great deal more work and reflection to be done, and there are a host of questions that need to be answered. But the leadership team believes that forming an "enterprise" congregation with multiple sites is an exciting potential solution. Each Bellevue site would continue with their current worship and ministry practices but look for ways to learn from one another and possibly approach various aspects of ministry collectively

when appropriate. At the enterprise level, efficiency and cost savings are possible by using common software and by sharing staffing for communications, bookkeeping, and some pastoral tasks.

We believe that God is leading us to explore new and exciting ways to worship and be in mission with fellow Lutheran churches in our Synod cluster. We are in prayerful discernment as we discuss many ideas for partnership. It will take many months, if not years, to fully explore how this might occur. And along the way, there will be multiple opportunities to take an "off ramp" if the vision becomes impractical or unhelpful.

The Saint Andrew's Congregation Council supports this vision of a partnership but also recognizes that there are concerns many members may have. We will continue to communicate what is going on in the monthly VOICE newsletter, in periodic listening post forums and at the congregational meetings of the Congregation. We will actively seek out ideas, concerns, and viewpoints as we explore where God may be leading us.

We are excited about the possibilities that could be generated by this partnership. We know that working together we can more faithfully steward our abundant resources and have an even greater missional impact. We pray that God will guide us and help us accomplish His will.

Council plans to set up several "mini forums' after church to allow people to ask questions and share their ideas and concerns as we work our way through this discernment. In addition, we will include a link on our website where documents, FAQs, and other information can be readily shared and updated as we go along.

There is much more work to be done to discover opportunities for partnership as well as understand what obstacles may exist. It will likely be at least a year or two before we come to a time for making any final decisions. But along the way, we will see where there are obvious opportunities to implement ideas of shared ministry and administration in the nearer term.

This is an exciting time. We don't yet know what God has in mind for us, but we will pray for his guidance and strength of spirit.

At the May 13 Congregation Council Meeting....

Committee Name Change: The Council approved changing "Worship and Liturgical Arts" committee to "Worship and Music".

Pastor Lara Forbes' Report:

- Pastor Lara reported that the first Communion Service at Timber Ridge was held on May 2 and it went very well with 30 people in attendance. All of them appreciated our time and willingness to hold these services.
- In partnership with St Luke's Lutheran Church, we will host a **Pride Worship Service** at Saint Andrew's on June 22. See "Eastside Love & Justice Pride Service" on page 2 for details.

Silver Oak Montessori School:

- Silver Oak Montessori School has approached Saint Andrew's to lease classrooms in South Hall. Their mission is to serve low-income families.
- The congregation needs to authorize the Executive Committee or Council to proceed with exploring the request and negotiating a potential lease. The Council approved a resolution that recommends that a vote be taken in the June 9, 2024 Semi-Annual meeting authorizing Council or the Executive Committee to negotiate a lease on behalf of the congregation with Silver Oak Montessori.

• A **Bequest Task Force** has been formed to develop a policy and procedures for determining the use of unrestricted bequests given to Saint Andrew's. Dave Vossler is the chair.

Synod Assembly Recap

Published in The Spirit, June 2024 edition

The Synod Assembly held on May 18, 2024, was attended by a total of 337 synod members including 275 voting members, six observers, and 56 visitors/volunteers. We give thanks to our host congregation, Grace Lutheran Church in Des Moines, to all who assisted in the planning and leadership of the day, and to all the attendees.

We began our time together in worship – centered on our theme, "We Lift Our Eyes" – from Psalm 121. It was a joy-filled service with special music from Grace Lutheran Church Music Director

Amy Boers, the GLC Choir, and members of the Mariachi Club from Pacific Lutheran University. During the service, we officially installed Reverend Judy Brennan as our Director for Evangelical Mission. We are grateful that we received over \$5600 in offering that will be shared between Lutheran Community Services Northwest (LCSNW), Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR), and the NW Washington Synod Bishop's Caring Fund (supports rostered leaders by providing scholarships and emergency aid). THANK YOU for your generosity!

Assembly business items included approving the recommended changes to our synod constitution that were forwarded from the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly and the 2025 Synod Budget. The presented budget was amended to include increased compensation for our rostered synod staff members so that they would receive synod guidelines. (A note from the bishop: while this budget approval is an affirming sign and appreciated, it also calls for increased mission support from our congregations. Please encourage your congregation leaders to prayerfully consider increasing your congregation's mission support this year.)

Following Synod Council approval, the assembly joyfully received our newest congregation, Hope Church in Lake Stevens. Originally a Covenant Congregation, they left that denomination and began exploring what it would mean to become an ELCA congregation. They began renting from Holy Cross Lutheran in Lake Stevens and had many conversations about what it might mean to do ministry together. Although that partnership never came to fruition, through those discussions Hope discerned a call to stay in Lake Stevens and become an ELCA congregation.

In addition to the written reports shared ahead of the assembly, we received oral reports from our Synod Officers: Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee, Vice President Kay Edgerton, Treasurer Bart Brosten, and Synod Secretary Rev. Netsie Griffith. These reports are posted on our assembly webpage: <u>https://www.lutheransnw.org/synod-assembly</u>

Additionally, we shared video reports and stories from Ministry Partners and Synod Committees. You will find these – and written reports received – also posted on our assembly webpage. Look for a link to view a recording of the full assembly to be posted on the synod website soon.

A handful of synod members donned fun flame headbands to share stories of how the Spirit is working in our synod in new or surprising ways. We heard about a group of youth ministry leaders joining forces to offer opportunities for their young people; how one congregation is being transformed by the welcome and inclusion of Spanish-speaking neighbors; how another congregation challenged themselves to learn more about what it means to welcome and support a leader of color; how one cluster of congregations is collaborating to support one another in new ways; and how a passion for archery is creating a new sacred space. (Look for more of these stories next year!)

Finally, we held elections for Synod Council, the Committee on Discipline, the Consultation Committee, and for 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly Voting Members. THANK YOU to all the nominees for allowing their names to go forward for consideration. We are so grateful to have such talented and gifted people open to serving! Our Mission

"To ensure that every child in the Bellevue School District who needs food will receive a pack of food to bring home for the weekend. We believe that this will enable the child to be nourished and can succeed in school."

Background

Backpack Meals for Kids is a community based non-profit

organization run entirely by volunteers. The program is entering its 14th year taking on the challenge of feeding kids experiencing food insecurity within the Bellevue School District.

From the first of September 2023 to the end of March 2024, we have distributed over 26,000 packs of food for the weekend to 1200 children. The children can choose their type of food from six menus.

How Saint Andrew's Members are Involved

In August of 2023 the youth from Saint Andrew's and other churches doing the tiny house build at Mt. Si Lutheran Church put together 200 pre-school packs to be distributed in September 2023. Then at the March 2024 OWLS (Older Wiser Lutheran Saints) gathering 400 packs were put together in record time by Saint Andrew's members.

There are several members of Saint Andrew's already involved as volunteers. Shirley Hobson, Ed Corker, and Jay Baxter deliver meals and Joe Banuelos helps with the loading of the cars.

Current Opportunities to Support

Volunteer to help distribute meals during the school year on Thursdays. It is easy and you can choose your schools.

Kafika House, Tanzania

et us rejoice!! With new leadership in the North Central Lutheran Diocese in Arusha, Tanzania, the bishop, and the general secretary have invited KAFIKA HOUSE (formerly known as The Plaster House) to return to their original site in Ngaramtoni, just outside Arusha. It is the site that

was designed and built for the purpose of their work: providing a high love, low-cost, post-surgical treatment of children! They will keep their current administrative headquarters at the Themi Hill site in east Arusha, but the most important and valuable treatment and accommodation departments will move back starting June 1. They will continue to develop the needed surgical center on newly purchased land in Likamba, west of Arusha. Also, Kafika House Director Sarah Rejman has now negotiated with several surgical centers in Arusha who can provide the best care appropriate for the specific need at the least expense. The new sites, located more distantly in Moshi and Karatu, continue to function well. As Sarah wrote, "the dream is happening in real time." Almost daily more children are being treated, enabled to return to normal lives.

In March they opened KAFIKA HOUSE **MOSHI** where the focus is on children with spina bifida and hydrocephalus. Their mamas stay with them on site enabling a different model of care for a longer healing journey. Sarah, the Director, met with Cure Children's Hospital in Kenya who provide surgical care for children living with disabilities. She also visited Bethany Kids who provide training to pediatric surgeons. She also joined the Tanzania Management and Development for Health team to further rehabilitation services, developing Basic Standards for Specialized Rehabilitation Hospitals organized by the Ministry of Health. KAFIKA HOUSE is taking their place alongside the people shaping Tanzania's rehabilitative health plans and policies. These relationships are key to expanding the ministry of KAFIKA HOUSE.

While Sarah has been making connections, the surgeons, nurses, and anesthetists of One World Medical Relief have recently returned. They transformed the lives of 55 children with cleft lip and palate, birth defects, and burn scar contractures. All volunteered their time and talent to surgeries and training. We praise God for the gifts of healing and thank you for your support of the unique work of KAFIKA HOUSE
